CROP DAMAGE BY FROSTS LESS THAN WAS EXPECTED.

Corn Escaped Except in Kansas, Nebraska, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Dakotas.

Washington, Sept. 22.—The Weather Bureau's weekly crop bulletin, issued today, says:

Notwithstanding the occurrence of light and heavy frosts generally throughout the corn belt, corn escaped injury except in the western portion of Kansas and Nebraska and in the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

While low temperatures have prevented rapid ripening, especially over the Western districts, the crop as a whole has advanced favorably, though the late planted in the Ohio Valley and Tennessee has suffered from drought.

Except in portions of the eastern districts of the cotton belt, where cotton picking has been interrupted by rains, the weather conditions have been favorable for gathering the crop, and this work has progressed rapidly in all districts.

ILLINOIS CROP CONDITIONS. Corn Passed Through the Cold Spell Practically Unscathed.

Springfield, Ill., Sept. 22.—Corn passed through the cold spell practically unscathed, says William G. Burns, director of the Illinois section of the Weather Bureau, United States Department of Agriculture, in his bulletin issued today covering the climate and crop conditions for the week ending September 21.

He gives the following general summary of the conditions: The week opened warm, with a temperature considerably above the seasonal average; there was a decided fall in the middle part, continuing in part to heavy frosts on the morning of the 17th and 18th in the central and northern districts; the temperature rose rapidly in the latter part of the week, except in portions of the northern district, where rain still needed; the distribution of rainfall was quite uneven throughout the State.

Conditions in the southwest. Frost Apparently Does Little Damage in Missouri and Illinois.

Washington, Sept. 22.—The weekly crop report, issued from the Weather Bureau, gives local conditions in the Southwest States as follows: Missouri—Rainy weather first of week, with low temperature, retarding progress of late corn.

TEXAS CROP CONDITIONS. Believed That Little Damage Was Done by the Light Frost.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 22.—Today the Texas section of the United States Weather Bureau issued its weekly crop bulletin for the week ending September 21, describing weather conditions. It says: Good showers fell over the west portion of the State, but the eastern half of the State was a decided drought.

PRESIDENT WAS OUT CHOPPING WOOD.

Suspicious - Looking Stranger Who Called to See Him Was Arrested.

LATER HE WAS RELEASED.

Said He Came to Oyster Bay From New York to See Roosevelt Merely Out of Curiosity—Had No Return Ticket.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 22.—A suspicious character giving his name as Samuel Swenon, who is a slightly built man, about 25 years old, with a brown beard and mustache, blue eyes and a strongly foreign cast of countenance, walked up the roadway leading to Sagamore Hill about 4:30 this afternoon.

PRESIDENT AWAY CHOPPING WOOD. Swenon told the officer that he was a Swede and had come from New York to see the President and Sagamore Hill.

The man was turned back by the officer, who told him the President was not at home. Swenon, who said he was a gardener, looked curiously about the grounds and then started on his return to the village.

SUSPICIONS QUIETED. His only object in coming to Oyster Bay, he said, was to see Sagamore Hill and the President, about whom he had heard and read a great deal.

After examining him thoroughly, the officers were convinced that he was entirely harmless, and that he was neither an anarchist nor a socialist. He readily acceded to the suggestion of the officers that he leave the village.

CARDINAL GIBBONS IS WARMLY GREETED.

Head of Catholic Church in America Returns From Rome in Rugged Health.

HEARS ADDRESS OF WELCOME.

Makes Brief Talk in Response and Visits Monastery of Passionists Order - Pays High Tribute to New Pope.

REPUBLIC SPECIAL. New York, Sept. 22.—Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore, head of the Roman Catholic Church in the United States, returned home today on the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse after an absence of several months, during which he attended the funeral of Pope Leo XIII and the election of Pius X.

At Quarantine the Reverend Father Boland, Father Corrigan and R. B. Tippett, supreme president of the Catholic Benevolent Legion, boarded the vessel and were cordially received by the Cardinal.

Mr. Tippett read a formal address of welcome, referring to the sad event which called the Cardinal to Rome and the joyous one which took place before his return.

Cardinal Gibbons replied, in part, as follows: "Mr. President and Members of the Catholic Benevolent Legion: I did not anticipate any such welcome as has been tendered to me here this morning, and, therefore, I have no adequate reply to make to these kind and cordial words of greeting."

"You have been pleased to refer to the date of my ordination. Those were dark and troublesome days. My ordination was almost coincident with the beginning of the Civil War, and every French State that left the Union brought a fresh pang to my heart."
