St. Louis and Kansas City, Says Bradstreet, Give Best Trade Advices of Any Cities in Country.

New York, Oct. 9.—Bradstreet's will to-morrow say of the state of trade: Business is of fair volume, but not so active as a year ago, partly because of the backward season, heavy rains interfering with crop movement and collections, vexatious labor troubles, past and present, discouraging building operations, and the spread of the conservative feeling among buyers, based upon stock-market liquidation and the feeling that high prices of many products will tend, if it has not already done so, to automatically check consumption.

Wholesale Trade Is Active at Baltimore.

Baltimore, Oct. 9.—Wholesale trade is active at Baltimore, a brisk business has been transacted in fall clothing, and the outlook for spring is considered bright.

—Manufacturers are busy at Philadelphia, but building materials and chemicals are quiet, with collections slow in several lines.

—The growing weakness in pig iron, though on the whole it is unduly heavy, have the effect of shutting off production to the extent of 1,000,000 tons for the last quarter of the year.

—The best trade advices come from the Southwest, where the weather is better than from the West, and the outlook for the coming year is considered bright.
