NEW PRESIDENT'S PLEAS ARE VAIN.

Recognition of Dominican Government Depends on Its Acceptance of Old Obligations.

FRESH REVOLTS REPORTED. Provisional Officials Are in Desperate Financial Straits and Presence of Gunboat Is Considered Desirable.

San Domingo, Dec. 2.—General Augustin, President of the provisional Government of Santo Domingo, had a long interview last night with United States Minister Powell, in which he demanded that General Galvan, former Minister of Finance, should be withdrawn from the board appointed by the Government of President Vio y Gil to arbitrate the claims of the Santo Domingo Improvement Company.

Minister Powell declined to grant this demand and supplemented his declaration by the statement that the United States Government will only recognize the provisional Government of Santo Domingo when it agreed to strictly observe all the acts and engagements entered into by former Governments with the United States.

It is reported here that a disturbance headed by General Candeliario Rose has broken out at Barahona, on the south coast of the island.

The general situation remains unsettled, and there have been many demonstrations of dissatisfaction. It is rumored that several places in the north of the island are by no means tranquil, and it is considered desirable that the United States gunboat Newport should remain here.

The financial condition of the provisional Government is desperate. Discharge Mrs. Ella Ford Who Was Arrested on a Charge of Whipping Unfaithful Spouse.

"It would be a Godsend to St. Louis if every woman would do as you have in this case," remarked Judge Tracy in discharging Mrs. Ella Ford of No. 423 South Leffingwell street, whose arrest Tuesday night followed a whipping she gave her husband with a raw hide.

Mrs. Ford, with her sister, Mrs. Minnie Fay, of No. 294 Adams street, appeared before Judge Tracy as defendant to the charge of disturbing the peace. Patrolman Davidson appeared to prosecute them.

The matron testified that she was called to Geismann's saloon, No. 274 Manchester avenue, being informed that there was a disturbance there. When he and Patrolman Slats arrived they saw a man and woman run from the place and escape. Two women followed them, one carrying a whip.

The complainant in the suit is the Gerhart Realty Company of No. 707 Chestnut street, which had entered into a contract on May 21 last with Welter, for the rental to him by the month of the building he occupies with the usual stipulation that he was to give up possession on thirty days' notice.

The Building Commissioner, I am informed, has begun proceedings to be heard in the First District court on the 8th, on the allegation that Welter has never seen to the Forester Hotel Company, which is composed of members of the Home Brewing Company, and who propose to erect a building on the premises.

SAY PATROLMAN BECAME ABUSIVE.

Police Commissioners Will Investigate Charges Against Patrick Noonan.

The Board of Police Commissioners tomorrow will hear the charges against Patrolman Patrick Noonan, who is accused of having assaulted two men and attempted to strike three others while intoxicated in DeHolloman street yesterday morning.

Noonan joined the force last August and was assigned to the Tenth District. He is more than six feet in height and weighs 300 pounds. He was a motorman on the Suburban line before he became a policeman.

After going off his beat last night, it is charged Noonan became intoxicated. He appeared at Patrick Gorman's saloon, near the Suburban car sheds. There he met Wesley King and Arthur Miles, Suburban conductors.

They charge that without provocation Noonan began beating them with his fists and club. They ran, but before they got away from him, sustained bruises which are now being treated by Doctor Olney A. Ambrose of No. 383 Beach avenue.

Two of his other Suburban employees, Forest Park Station where he spent the night in a cell. Yesterday afternoon Noonan was taken to the Tenth District Station, where Captain O'Malley suspended him pending the action of the Police Board.
