WOMEN DEMAND EQUAL SUFFRAGE.

Resolutions Prepared for Convention at Which Thirty States are Represented.

PROTEST AGAINST INJUSTICE.

Declare Women Will Not Suffer Longer Privileges Extended to Filipinos. Washington, Feb. 11.—The thirty-sixth annual convention of the National American Woman's Suffrage Association, was called to order here this afternoon by Mrs. Carrie Fiske Catt, national president of that body.

The sessions will continue during the week. The main interest in the proceedings centers about a declaration of principles embodied in a woman's bill of rights, presented by Miss Ida Husted Harper, at a session of the Executive Committee, preliminary to the convention, and which was adopted this afternoon.

This declaration sets forth that though "our forefathers bore an equal part in the Revolution, its triumph brought to them no added rights and, through all the following century and a quarter, taxation without representation has been continuously imposed on women by as great a tyranny as King George exercised over the American colonists."

It protests against the injustice of non-representation of women in the affairs of the nation, in view of the billions of dollars on which they pay taxes, and demands that the 1904 wage-earning women of the country the same protection of the ballot as is possessed by wage-earning men.

TRANSIT LOAN TO BE EXTENDED.

Reorganization Plans Reported Since Wade and Thompson's Return. Arrangements were practically completed at a meeting at the Mercantile Trust Company yesterday for continuing the loan on the Transit Company bonds and for the reorganization of the company.

On the strength of the report that plans for extending the loan would be successful trading in Transit was brisk, and the stock was much stronger.

EXPOSE SMUGGLING SCHEME.

United States authorities connected with the Immigration Bureau have received information that may lead to the arrest of a gang of Chinamen in Chicago thought to be engaged in smuggling their brother Mongolians into the United States by means of secreting them in box cars in Canada opposite Detroit.

RELATIVES OF DEAD CHINAMAN SAY CONTRACT WAS NOT FULFILLED.

The Chinaman was killed for St. Louis, where he had relatives, but, according to the agreement between his relatives in St. Louis and the Chicago firm, the Chinaman was to be delivered here alive.

Dempsey Barco of Stallings was yesterday found guilty of the killing of Michael Bailey, one of his employees, at Long Lake on Monday, October 5, 1903, and his punishment fixed at twenty-five years in the penitentiary.
