FRIENDS WERE JUDGE AND JURY

Thomas McAuliffe and Gottfried Walbaum Agreed Upon Novel Method to Settle Suit.

HELD COURT OF THEIR OWN.

After Witnesses Had Told Their Stories the Referees Agreed Upon Verdict of \$4,000, and It Was Paid Forthwith.

New York, April 19.—With two men well known to the sporting world as plaintiff and defendant, with two others equally well known as judges and jury and as witnesses, half a dozen other men whose faces may be seen any racing day on the bookmakers' line in the betting parlors of the metropolitan race tracks, there was tried and decided a \$30,000 damage suit.

Thomas McAuliffe, known about the race tracks for years, was the plaintiff in the case, and the defendant was Gottfried Walbaum, the bookmaker. Joseph Vendig and Max Blumenthal, both members of the Metropolitan Bookmakers' Association, were the judges, and the court was a private room in an uptown hotel.

CAUSE OF SUIT. McAuliffe has but one arm, and several months ago when departing from the Astoria Club he walked through a half-open door leading to a stairway. In his fall he was severely injured. He fell face downward, cutting his face and his neck, besides breaking several ribs. He was under medical treatment for some time.

THE TRIAL. In another day Vendig had been chosen by the plaintiff and Blumenthal by the defendant as judges, witnesses had been notified to be at the hotel at a certain hour, and both sides had been ready.

NO PLACE FOR JERSEY LILY'S RACING CUP.

World's Fair Live-Stock Department Politely Rejected Mrs. Langtry's Offer to Exhibit Ascot Trophy.

The Ascot gold cup of Mrs. Langtry, the Jersey Lily, will not be an exhibit at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. According to the report of the chiefs of the various departments, there does not seem to be any place for it.

Several weeks ago the press agent for Mrs. Langtry notified the Director of Exhibits that the actress would be willing to have her gold cup, the celebrated Ascot trophy, exhibited at the World's Fair.

The Director of this department ruled that horse races have nothing in common with physical culture, so all the correspondence was returned to Miss Hayward.

Consequently the Louisiana Purchase Exposition probably will have to get along without it, and English visitors who come here expecting to see the Jersey Lily's prize trophy will be disappointed.

GUARD TO BE INCREASED.

Seven Hundred to Patrol Grounds During Summer Months. Colonel E. P. Kingsbury, commandant of the Jefferson Guard, announced yesterday that the guard would be rapidly increased from the present time until the number reaches 700, with which force he expects to patrol the grounds during the summer months of the Exposition, and possibly during the later months.

There are now over 300 guards on the grounds and they are being drilled daily by army officers. By good discipline and by having the money in the hands of the Exposition, Colonel Kingsbury expects to make up for any deficiency of number.

The new dress uniforms for the guard have arrived and were given out to the men yesterday. As soon as the Fair opens these uniforms will be worn continually. The new dress is very pretty, being sky blue, with trouser and cuff stripes of narrow braid in the Exposition colors—red, white, blue and yellow.

On the army officers detailed by the Government for special service on the guard arrived in St. Louis yesterday. He is W. O. Reed of the Sixth Cavalry, stationed at Fort Meade, S. D. The officers of the guard will be mounted during the Fair, so as to enable them to get around quicker.


