

MISSOURI'S COAL OUTPUT SHOWS A RAPID INCREASE.

In the Last Year 4,265,326 Tons Were Produced. Worth \$4,730,515.—Macon County in Lead.

REPUBLICAN SPECIAL. Columbia, Mo., July 15.—That the coal industry of Missouri is increasing at a rapid rate is shown by the report of Charles Evans, State Coal Inspector.

In the last year 4,265,326 tons of coal were mined of a market value of \$4,730,515. Ten years ago the annual production of coal in the State was a little over 2,000,000 tons, and the annual market value was only about \$2,000,000.

The continued annual increase in production, aside from a growing demand, may be attributed to the opening of many new mines, the enlargement of old ones and the very great improvement in mine equipment. Many large coal fields in the State are only waiting the building of railroads to make their operation profitable.

Thirty-seven counties in Missouri produce coal. Macon County leading in the number of tons produced annually. In the year just closed Macon County produced 1,115,546 tons.

TOWNSITE FIGHTS ENDED. Owners in Two Indian Territory Towns Now to Obtain Titles.

REPUBLICAN SPECIAL. Muskogee, I. T., July 15.—The Indian Inspector today sent representatives to the towns of Okmulgee and Tulsa with a report on all the contested lots that have been tied up on account of this contest over title.

The contests have been passed upon by the Secretary of the Interior, and the owners of the lots can now get title to them.

This is the best news that has been received there for some time. There are thousands of contested lots in the Government towns of the Creek Nation, and there are all the rapidly settled by the Indian Inspector. These contest cases were inherited as a part of the Townsite Commission's unfinished work when that body was unexpectedly retired from service in the Creek Nation two years ago.
