HELD POLICE FORCE AT BAY FOR HOURS

Frank Pierce Killed His Wife at Canton, Ill., and Defied Authorities to Touch It.

BARRICADED HIMSELF IN HOME

Deputy Sheriffs Finally Caught Him Unawares and Overpowered Him, Using Chloroform.

Peoria, Ill., July 21.—Frank Pierce to-day shot and killed his wife at their home in Canton, Fulton County, and then held the entire Canton police force at bay for several hours. The Sheriff's force finally was summoned from Lewistown.

Thrown off his guard by Undertaker Messler, who consented to enter and prepare the body for burial, officers rushed in and captured Pierce after a desperate fight. They were shooting at chloroform him.

Pierce, after forcing his wife three times, barricaded himself in the upper portion of the house and through the closed shutters announced that he would kill the first officer to set foot on his premises. His mother passed in and out of the house at will, but he would not permit her near the death chamber.

He requested his brother-in-law, Charles McCastin, to come to the house to talk regarding the disposition of his effects, and Fred Messler, an undertaker, came for his wife's body, but both refused, and he had been taken prisoner. He said there would be another dead one in the house as soon as he talked with his brother-in-law.

Pierce is supposed to be insane.

CITY COUNSELOR GIVES OPINION ON NORWOOD POND.

Municipality Not Ready to Pay Its Share of Expense—Protest Against Grading Camp.

At a meeting of the Board of Health yesterday the City Counselor's opinion was read in the matter of removing Norwood pond, a nuisance which the board is anxious to obliterate. The opinion is in favor of the property holders in the vicinity, as it says that, according to the law, those whose holdings abut property that is to be improved cannot be made to pay their pro rata of the expense of improvement unless the city is ready to shoulder its share of the expense.

The pond was laid out several years ago, but as the city did not care to go to the expense of filling the hole, the street was not extended. The city is still in the same condition, and it is probable that the pond will remain for a few years more. Norwood pond was formerly a stone quarry.

A petition signed by about thirty residents in the vicinity of Union and McPherson avenues was read, which asked that a grading camp be removed from the southeast corner of those streets.

The camp belongs to the Heman Construction Company. It is claimed to interfere with the health of men and animals that are quartered there, the petition recites. It is dangerous to the health of the community. Residents of Portland place also signed the petition.

WOMAN CHARGES ROUGH TREATMENT BY FAIR GUARDS.

Miss Madeline Christen Says Attendants Thrust Her From Education Building Causing Her to Fall.

Miss Madeline Christen of No. 718 Marlon street, an employe of the German exhibit in the Education building at the World's Fair, has complained to her employer that she was handled roughly and thrown to the ground yesterday morning while entering the building.

Guards waiting at the Education Palace and inspect the passes of employes early each morning as they enter. Sometimes when a person is known the guards do not bother them, but on other occasions without a presentation, Miss Christen's ticket was demanded yesterday morning. It is claimed that the guard who was joking, she passed in, and then she was thrown to the ground.

Chief Richter, who is in charge of the German exhibit, is very much wrought up over the action of the guards. He says several of his women employes were handled in the same manner before and that complaint was made to the Exposition authorities.

PHILIPPINES NOT MISREPRESENTED

Chief Stone Says Sign Tells They Form a Part of Population.

Senior Nipponensis' criticism of the Philippine Exposition at the World's Fair that it gives a wrong and injurious impression of the Philippines and their population, is replied to by Herbert S. Stone, Chief of the Department of Publicity of the Philippine Exposition.

Mr. Stone's objection to the prominent sign that since the opening of the Exposition has hung conspicuously at the Exposition is the Igorrote village, which reads as follows: Igorrote village, several hundred huts on mountain regions of Northern Luzon. Population 1,000. Bontoc, eight miles from Iloilo. 400,000 of the total population of the Philippine Islands exceeds 1,000,000 of people, over six-sevenths of whom are civilized Christians."

Mr. Stone said it should be apparent that any misconception as to the relative importance of the Igorrote and the upper-class Filipino would be corrected rather than the carelessness of the visitor in his neglect of the Philippine Exposition Board.

SECRETARY'S SALARY REDUCED.

Board of Lady Managers Will Pay Miss Carter \$100 a Month.

Miss Etta Louise Carter, who was elected by the Board of Lady Managers last week to the secretaryship in place of Miss Lavina Egan, will take up her new duties on Monday.

The salary of Miss Carter will be \$100 a month, \$60 a year, that received by Miss Egan, who is a member of the board.
