BALDWIN AIRSHIP TO MAKE A FLIGHT. Either the Inventor or A. R. Knabeneue Will Man Craft in Cruise.

MISHAP TO GAS-MAKING PLANT. French Aeronaut Disappointed Because Accident Will Delay His Ascent, but He Is Getting Ready.

Another mishap to the hydrogen gas plant at the Aeronautic Concourse last night made a recourse to the primitive methods of generating gas by acid and iron filings necessary to fill the Baldwin balloon.

Baldwin's balloon will be filled by this morning and either Baldwin or Knabeneue will make an ascension this afternoon in the California Arrow.

The framework and machinery of the Francoeur airship is all set up in the aeronautic building, ready to be attached to the balloon for a flight whenever gas is available.

DEMOCRATS SHOW CLEAN RECORDS

Commissioner of Supplies Says There Has Been No Parallel to Walbridge Case.

FLING AT MORTON ANSWERED.

Municipality Ceased Purchasing Goods From Late Councilman's Concern When He Became an Official.

In reply to a communicated article published on the editorial page of the Globe-Democrat, October 25, over the initials "W. H. O.," in which the writer alluded to the Walbridge-Merrill Drug Company incident and cited the case of the late Isaac W. Morton as a parallel, John P. Boyce, Commissioner of Supplies, has submitted copies of letters, on file in his office, which show that he took action immediately after his appointment to prevent the purchase of supplies by the city of St. Louis from any concern in which city officials were interested.

The paragraph from the Globe-Democrat referring to Mr. Morton follows: "When the late Isaac W. Morton—one of the most honorable of men—was the vice president of the present Democratic City Council, it was the city prohibited from buying anything from the large line of commodities sold by the Simmons Hardware Company, even in an emergency or as the lowest bidder, in order that Mr. Morton, one of its principal directors and advisers, should not be branded as a criminal."

The following letters, one from Commissioner Boyce to Mayor Wells, and the other from Associate City Counselor Woerner to Mayor Wells, are on file in letter books in Commissioner Boyce's office: St. Louis, Mo., May 11, 1904.—Honorable Tolla Wells, Mayor of the City of St. Louis: Since entering this office and examining some of the records, I find that the city has been buying supplies from the Simmons Hardware Company, of which Mr. Isaac W. Morton, recently elected to the City Council, is an advisory director.

We have also purchased lumber from the firm of Roberts, Rolfe & Co., which has recently sold out to the Eau Claire Lumber Company, in which Mr. Henry G. Rolfe, a member of the City Council, is an officer.

I have the honor to request you to ask an opinion from Honorable C. W. Bates, City Counselor, as to whether or not this office can legally buy any supplies from the said firms, owing to the fact that the gentlemen above named are members of these various firms.
