## TEAMSTERS MAY ATTEMPT TO ENJOIN EXPOSITION COMPANY.

Hauling Away of Salvage Raises Question as to Right to Enter World's Fair Grounds.

A question which may have to be settled in the courts has arisen with the approach of the reworking of the World's Fair buildings and the hauling of the salvage and debris from the grounds.

A representative of teamsters and haulers, who have purchased salvage at the World's Fair and have taken contracts to remove the stuff, called at various offices in the City Hall yesterday to seek aid in enforcing the Exposition Company to allow them to enter the World's Fair with their teams.

He stated that the General Service Company which is closely allied with the Exposition management and has exclusive hauling privileges on the grounds, would allow outside teamsters to haul stuff within the gates.

The city officials stated that they could do nothing as the Exposition Company, under one interpretation of the law, has control of the site for six months yet and a year under another. The representatives of the haulers declared that there would be converted legal action.

## KENTUCKY'S EXHIBITS TO BE PLACED IN NEW CAPITOL.

State Commission Saved \$2,500 Out of \$75,000 Appropriation—Plans for the Governor.

Kentucky's exhibits in the various palaces at the World's Fair will form the nucleus of a permanent State museum in the new State Capitol at Frankfort.

The Kentucky Commission has decided to send their exhibits in the Palaces of Mines and Metallurgy, Forestry, Fish and Game and Agriculture to Lexington, where they will be stored until the completion of the new Capitol. The exhibits are said to be an excellent representation of the resources of the Blue Grass State. The piano in the main hall of the building will be sent to the Executive Mansion for the personal use of the family of Governor Beckham and the best Governor of Kentucky. The piano cost \$1,000.

The Kentucky Commission expects to have a balance in the treasury of \$2,500 out of the appropriation of \$75,000. A resolution was passed commending President A. Y. Ford and Secretary Robert E. Hughes for their services.
