

EAMES RE-ELECTED IN SHARP CONTEST

St. Louis Man Remains President of American Institute of Architects.

BROOKLYN DELEGATES' WAR.

Regulars Meet and Choose Officers Before Independents Appear and a Second Ballot Is Taken to Prevent Rupture.

The Republic Bureau, Washington, Jan. 13.—The St. Louis man was successful today in an unexpected contest in the convention of the American Institute of Architects for re-election to the presidency of the body. It was the first raffish of the hitherto placid waters of the convention.

A plan was devised to beat Mr. Eames and the "regular" set of officers. But the majority defeated the move and expressed confidence in and appreciation of the St. Louis man's work as the chief officer.

An undercurrent of ill feeling has existed since the beginning of the convention, because of a contest made by the elements in control upon the Brooklyn delegates, and the latter decided to make war.

The regular ticket consisted of W. G. Eames for re-election as president, Alfred Stone first vice president, Cass Gilbert second vice president, Glenn Brown secretary and treasurer, and W. A. Borngren, J. M. Donnell, F. M. Ross, E. J. Butler, J. C. Hornberger and S. S. Remann for directors, and Robert Stead and J. G. Hill as auditors.

The independents quietly nominated Robert S. Peabody of Boston for the presidency, S. S. Remann for vice president, and A. J. Dyer for director, in place of Mr. Donnell.

The regulars announced last night that the session would be opened at 10 o'clock this morning, when the Nominating Committee would report. Instead of this, the independents called the convention to order at 10:45 and immediately announced the regular nominees and then declared all nominees "out."

At 10 o'clock the independents appeared and resolved the shock of their lives when they heard of what had been done. Wallace, in full of Brooklyn charged unfairness and offered a resolution that the report of the Nominating Committee be rescinded, and that the names of Mr. Peabody and the other independents be placed upon the list of candidates.

Such a course required a recess of fifteen minutes was taken to allow the delegates to discuss the course to be pursued. The independents won, as the resolution was adopted.

There was some excitement when Charles E. Woodbridge, chairman of the Brooklyn delegation, announced that Mr. Peabody's name was to be used. The gentlemen's knowledge of consent, and that the Brooklyn delegation intended to support President Eames and the regular ticket.

Similar charges were made in regard to the other candidates, but in each case the majority of all independent candidates and that the assertions to the contrary were untrue. Voting was then begun, with much shouting.

W. S. Eames, for president, received 518 votes, as against 412 for Peabody, 101 for Stone, 65 for Brown, 54 for Borngren, 43 for Donnell, 32 for Ross, 21 for Butler, 19 for Hornberger, and 18 for Remann. The Brooklyn delegation intended to support President Eames and the regular ticket.

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WALLACE TO FACE ACCUSER HERE

Alleged Bigamist to Be Brought to St. Louis From Kansas City To-Day.

CHARGE HE MARRIED THRICE.

Mrs. Wallace Says She Is the Second Woman to Marry Him—She Secured Evidence Against Husband.

Eugene W. Wallace, formerly special agent of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, who was arrested in Kansas City on a charge of having three wives, will be brought to St. Louis today to face Mrs. Marie M. Wallace, his second wife, who is his accuser.

Mrs. Wallace, who lives at No. 2825 Washington avenue, has spent two months in tracing Wallace's past, and declares that she has evidence that he has been married thrice, and probably four times without securing divorces from his former wives.

She placed the evidence she had accumulated before Circuit Attorney Sauer, who at once issued a warrant against Wallace, charging bigamy.

Wallace was located and arrested at Kansas City. Detective Patrick Murphy departed for that city yesterday, and is expected to return with the prisoner today.

According to Mrs. Wallace, who says she is wife No. 2, Wallace has a mania for being married, and made no attempt to conceal his wedding. In fact, she told the jury that she had secured evidence against him to the effect that he had married three times, and probably four times without securing divorces from his former wives.
