SPRING REVIVAL OF GOLDSMITH CLASSIC

Eleanor Robson and Kyrle Bellew to Interpret Famous Parts in "She Stoops to Conquer"—Mr. Mansfield's Production of "The Misanthrope."

New York, April 15.—And now for a Kate Hardcastle, with all the youth and sparkling graciousness which Doctor Oliver Goldsmith conceived for this character, and a young Marlow, who might have ordered just such a role from the good-natured Doctor had he lived in his time.

These are the parts which Eleanor Robson and Kyrle Bellew will essay in Monday's brilliant revival of "She Stoops to Conquer" at the New Amsterdam Theatre.

E. H. Sothern and Julia Marlowe found immediate favor in the Shakespearean plays, and there is as much reason why so distinguished a pair as Miss Robson and Mr. Bellew should garner fresh laurels in Goldsmith's classic.

At any rate, Eleanor Robson for a Kate Hardcastle and Kyrle Bellew for a dashing young Marlow give promise of a spright where the fancies of stage life lightly do turn to formidability in most attractive fashion.

For most in the cast after Miss Robson and Mr. Bellew, the most conspicuous is that of "The Misanthrope." Mrs. Gilbert of England, Mrs. Gilbert has been induced by Lebler & Co. to come to the city for the production. In her younger days she appeared here with Edwin Booth and with Henry Anderson, but for the last eight years she has declined to travel, even outside of London. Her role will be Mrs. Harcourt's part, which the London critics think she never had a superior or perhaps an equal.

Louis J. J. E. Doolittle, Sidney Drew and Frank Mills are some of the other well-known players in the troupe. The terms of the production are in the stage direction of William Seymour, and in many ways the management is striving to equalize the production to the best in the history of the play.

Mr. Richard Mansfield tried an interesting experiment last Monday night, in producing for the first time in this country an English version of Moliere's freshest comedy, "The Misanthrope."
It was followed attentively for three acts by a large audience, but toward the end the interest appeared to flag. The play was less impressive and less frequent, and at the fall of the curtain on the fifth act there was less enthusiasm than might have been expected from an audience which was mostly and heartily demonstrative at the end of the second and third acts.

The play was acted as it is now acted in France, and the French tradition has been interpolated in the text. The single scene, Moliere's drawing-room in which all the action passes, is pointed after drawings by Moliere.

The text used is that of Miss Katherine Tegen, who translated it into English. 
