Child, About Six Weeks Old, Escapes Injury, the Mother Seemingly to Shield Little One Even in Death—Policemen Force Crowd Back With Their Clubs—Body Remained Unidentified for Nine Hours—Frank W. Mullen Recognizes Wife at Morgue.

INFANT AT BETHESDA HOME.

The young woman who fell dead on the sidewalk at Broadway and Washington avenue with a baby in her arms yesterday afternoon was identified at 1:30 o'clock this morning as Mrs. Frank W. Mullen, wife of a Park avenue motorman, living at No. 3112 Locust street.

For nine hours the body lay at the morgue before it was identified. Mrs. Mullen was a victim of heart disease. She had gone to visit an aunt, Mrs. Moore of No. 87 Mound street, and was on her way home with her six-week-old infant when the fatal attack came upon her.

MAY SOON QUIT THE WABASH.

Friction With George Gould Said to Be the Cause of Resignation After Remarkable Extension of System.

At a meeting of the directors of the Wabash Railroad Company in New York yesterday the resignation of Joseph Ramsey Jr., president of the Wabash, as president of the Wabash Terminal Railroad Company was accepted and F. A. Delano, formerly general manager of the Burlington, was elected president of the Wabash Terminal property.

Regarding his resignation Mr. Ramsey stated that it was the result of friction between himself and the chairman of the Wabash road, George Gould. Mr. Ramsey declined to make any further statement. It is known that Mr. Ramsey presented his resignation to Mr. Gould as president of the Pittsburg Terminal Company last January, but that Mr. Gould persuaded him to defer action upon it.

MINISTER JOHN BARRETT RECALLED FROM PANAMA

State Department Dissatisfied With His Management of Affairs in the New Republic.

ERRORS IN CORRESPONDENCE.

Because of Inaccuracies in His Representations, It is Alleged, Secretary Hay Was Put to Disadvantage.

The Republic Bureau, Wyatt Building, 16th and F Streets, Washington, April 19.—United States Minister John Barrett, now at Panama, it is learned at the State Department, will soon be recalled. It is improbable that he will be assigned to another post. Administration officials express themselves as dissatisfied with his management of affairs on the isthmus.

Minister Barrett is well known in St. Louis and had a more or less conspicuous position in the last few years. At one time Minister to Spain and later representative of the United States in the Argentine Republic, he was retained by the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company as special emissary to countries of the far East.

Had received a note from the Panama Minister of Foreign Affairs, Senor Ariza, saying that it was deemed best to await discussion of the main question in Washington before continuing further the discussion in Panama. The net result, it is said at the State Department, was that Minister Barrett conveyed an inaccurate statement of the situation and caused Acting Secretary of State Adee to proceed under a misapprehension. Further analysis of the correspondence shows it is declared, that Minister Barrett misstated the position of the United States in his dealings with the Panama officials.

Minister John Barrett is soon to be recalled from Panama, the State Department being dissatisfied with his work there. FOREIGN. British warships are ordered to land Bay to quell disturbances on the Island of Crete.

TARDY JUSTICE FOR KANSAS CITY MAN. S. F. Scott Jr. reinstated in Post Office After Three Years and His Name Cleared of Suspicion—Guilty Man Convicted. Washington, April 19.—Tardy justice is done S. F. Scott Jr. of Kansas City, who was today reinstated in the registration division of the Kansas City Post Office as a clerk. He was suspended in December, 1901.

Washington, April 19.—A registered letter containing \$3000 which passed through his division, disappeared. Inquiry resulted in a report, which caused Scott's removal. Late evidence was secured, upon which John A. Flagg, a clerk in the same division, was tried and convicted. Meanwhile, three years had elapsed. But now Scott's good name is cleared.

HARBIN FEARFUL THAT VLADIVOSTOK WILL BE CUT OFF

Abundant Evidence That Japanese Are Planning to Interpose Force Between Two Cities.

Thousands Armed Men, Supposed to Be Manchurians, Attempted to Cut Railroad 100 Miles East of Lin-vitai's Base.

NO NEWS FROM THE FLEETS. Tokio Is Not Positively Informed as to Whereabouts of Rojostevsky's Squadron—Growing Indignation Against France.

Harbin, April 19.—There was a detected attempt on the night of April 17 to cut the railroad between Harbin and Vladivostok, a formidable body of Chinese bandits making an attack near the station of Imyarko, 100 miles east of Harbin. A desperate fight, which lasted several hours, the bandits were driven off and dispersed.

Many smaller companies of Chinese bandits are roving in the rear of the Russian army, but disappear when pursued. It is thought probable that they are Manchurians, who scatter to their villages when they find themselves in danger. There are various reports of a wide turning movement at Sitihar, or eastward of that point, but as yet these rumors are apparently unfounded.
