

GOVERNMENT TO AID DRUG FARMERS

United States Agricultural Experts Are Experimenting With Weeds in an Effort to Promote Unique Industry.

Washington, June 24.—Within the shadow of the Washington Monument on the low lying Potomac flats, the botanical experts of the Department of Agriculture are paving the way for the evolution of the drug farmer.

Certain wild plants possessing valuable medicinal properties are becoming rapidly extinct. Many common weeds now a weed to agricultural pursuits contain drug principles which make them a possible source of profit.

The Government botanists hope and believe they will demonstrate that the production of drug plants is a good business proposition.

Doctor Rodney H. True is the Government physician in charge of these interesting and extensive studies. He is assisted by Mr. W. W. Stockberger and a corps of botanists working in various parts of the country.

The plot of land on the Potomac flats that is being used for these studies is a similar farm as have been maintained elsewhere, one in South Carolina giving encouraging results. The products have been marketed at fair prices. Of course, the wide range of experiment, the culture of many different plants, simply in the desire to obtain comparative data has cost more than it has earned.

Many hard working American farmers would be surprised to see at this farm, the straight rows of jimson weed and blue belladonna and other weeds and fertilized with scientific exactness and subjected to the most exacting tests.

St. Louis, June 24.—Despite the fact that he never met his death in pursuit of a similar object, a quarter of a century ago, Theodore Maximilian Streu, an Iowa farmer, claims to be the direct lineal descendant of King Lazar, who was murdered by the Turks two hundred years ago.

Streu's part has been required to produce these documents from Europe. It is a long and arduous task, but he is determined to succeed.

The history of Serbia is full of tragedy, and the early literature of the nation is replete with the story of King Lazar's death.

Streu's claim is based on a document dated 1848, which states that he is the direct lineal descendant of King Lazar.
