

TO REMOVE 400 PATIENTS IN A DAY

Ambulances, Street Cars and Transfer Wagons Will Convey Sufferers From Old to New City Hospital.

Patients of the old City Hospital, Seventeenth and Pine streets, will be moved to the new City Hospital, Fourteenth street and Lafayette avenue. All the city ambulances, many street cars and several transfer wagons will be required to convey the patients. This work, it is estimated, will require the services of 400 men.

The new City Hospital is ready to receive patients. Within a few weeks after their installation there, everything will be in smooth running order. The new hospital has been needed for years, and the removal to the new building is being hailed with delight by the nurses, doctors and attendants.

Four of the group of buildings of the new City Hospital were accepted from the contractor by the Building Commission yesterday. They are the kitchen, the surgical, and the east and west out-patient buildings. They are ready for occupancy. More than four years have elapsed since the setting of the contract.

George Kingsland, deputy secretary to the Health Commissioner, was sent to the hospital to inspect the buildings and take an inventory of property and supplies belonging to the city.

USE OF PICTURES BASIS OF LAND COMPANY'S SUIT.

Alleged that Defendants Admitted Views of Arkansas as Those of Missouri Lots. Photographs of Arkansas soil alleged to have been used to stimulate the sale of land in Henry County, Mo. In the case of the suit filed in the United States District Court yesterday by the Hoe-Hoe-Towne Site Investment and Improvement Company, against the Davis-Elton Realty Company, and the Joplin Savings Bank, the plaintiff asks \$750 to cover the alleged loss sustained.

In the petition the plaintiff alleges it bought a tract of 10 acres, near the town of Hoe, Ark., December 1, 1904. Immediately after the purchase the land was divided into town lots, and the plaintiff then alleges that several photographs were made of the land and sent broadcast over the country attached to pamphlets giving description of the lots offered for sale. It alleges the defendants secured several of the photographs and reproduced them, and then mailed the pictures to various parts of Missouri with circulars alleging that the photographs were of town lots which the two firms offered for sale in Butterfield, Harry County, Mo.

The Arkansas firm alleges that the use of the photographs by the Davis-Elton Realty Company and the Joplin Savings Bank has depreciated the value of the land, and that the defendants are liable for the loss. The plaintiff asks for an injunction to prevent the defendants from using the photographs in any way.

Retired Army Officer Spends Day the Guest of William H. Thomson—His First Trip to St. Louis for Many Years.

General John Smith, retired, of the United States Army, was the guest yesterday of William H. Thomson of the Boatman's Bank. This is the first visit of General Smith to St. Louis since his retirement by President Roosevelt, three years ago, after his insular campaign in the Philippines, where he became famous as "Hell-Roaring Jake."

The officer, who retired with the rank of Major General, was accompanied by his wife and remained away from the United States for three years, traveling everywhere in Europe and Asia.

Mr. Thomson's two daughters traveled with them for nine months under the name of Mrs. Thomson. Mr. Thomson, who is now residing at the Hotel Hamilton, returned to St. Louis on Saturday and Sunday with the party.

General and Mrs. Smith departed last evening for a visit to relatives at Albert Lea, Minn., having been guests of Mr. Thomson at luncheon at the bank cafe yesterday afternoon, at which Captain Cornish of Jefferson Barracks was present.

General Smith and Mr. Thomson have been lifelong friends, their friendship dating from the time General Smith was stationed at Jefferson Barracks, years ago.

The distinguished soldier was so charmed with his visit to the Thomson Arcadia home that he contemplates purchasing property there upon which to build a summer residence.
