Justice Spanking Refused to Accept William E. Rebeck's Explanation of Miss Maud Parker's Injury.

William E. Rebeck of No. 1223 Missouri street was fined \$25 in the First District Court today for striking Miss Maud Parker of No. 4241 Biddle street on the cheek in a contest during the celebration of the Club carnival on the evening of July 11.

Rebeck admitted being in the conflict with the girl, but denied that he hit Miss Parker. "They threw confetti on me and I thought I was about to retire and was all out for fun," said Rebeck, "and I put my arms about her neck and forced her confetti down her throat. She did not bite her, and if she were injured it would have been my E.K. pin which scratched her face."
