FREE BRIDGE NOT OPPOSED BY ROADS

Director of Terminal Says Board Will Approve President McKinley's Offer to Lease Eads Roadway to City.

"An impression prevails," said an officer of the Eastern railroad and a director in the Terminal association yesterday, "that the railroad are opposed to the free-bridge project. There is no antagonism whatever. The free-bridge question was never discussed at any of the meetings."

The Terminal Board is ready, if it is confident, to enable a demonstration of the utility of a free bridge. Although President McKinley's offer was submitted to the Municipal Bridge and Terminal Commission his letter offering to ascertain whether the board would lease the roadway of Eads bridge to the city, believe the city will have the roadway on a free basis. This would be equivalent to a free bridge.

WOLFEY AFFECTS RATES. If St. Louis needs a free bridge, the railroad will not oppose its construction. The railroad have no interest in the bridge project, or three additional bridges would have no effect on the rates.

SOFT-COAL RATES ARE TO BE LOWER

Important Railroads Willing to Reduce the Charges Ten Cents Per Ton.

BENEFIT \$400,000 A YEAR. Commission Meets to Appoint Engineer on Terminal Facilities Matter and to Arrange for Total Absorption of Arbitrator.
