FATE OF FOOTBALL GAME SEEMS TO REST WITH PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

College Men Realize That Radical Changes Are Necessary in Rules—Harvard's Greatest Living Graduate Expected to Act as Final Arbiter and Dictator of the Manner in Which the Big College Game Is to Be Played in the Future.

Depreciation for the future of the game of football was the definite impression which practically closed in the East with Saturday's games. That great reform is coming and that radical changes are being made will abolish the game, at least for a year, appear to be the beliefs of those who are in the vanguard of the movement.

Some of the more commendable rules suggested are the abolition of the tackle below the knees, making the distance to be gained in three downs ten yards, instead of the usual five, and the bringing of more than one lineman back of the line, placing the three backs from ten to twenty feet back of the line, thus giving room for dodging and open play; forcing at least two of the three backs of the defending team to use a secondary defense to the line, to play at designated points in the back field for the purpose of stopping the running, and interesting runners on the opposing teams who have succeeded in rounding the ends, and prohibiting blocking within the tackles.
