HIS RECEPTION IN CARSON CITY

Grand Pageant - March Through the City - Enthusiasm of the People - Speeches of Judge Taylor and Dr. Ellis.

INTERVIEWS IN THE EVENING

The telegraph having reported, on Monday last, that Major L. R. Bradley, Governor elect of Nevada, would reach the city in the afternoon, preparations were commenced to give him a reception at once worthy of the man and the high office to which he had been chosen by the people.

THROUGH THE CITY.

Amid the roar of cannon and the shouts of the people, the procession marched down Carson street to Fourth, out Fourth to Ormsby, up Ormsby to Musser, thence east to Fall, down Fall to Second, and thence to the Ormsby House.

IN FRONT OF THE ORMSBY HOUSE

A stand had been erected and carpeted, while flags and rich banners streamed from the balcony and over the heads of the people in the street. Here the people, in vast numbers, assembled as the procession approached.

At the close of Judge Taylor's remarks, Dr. Ellis ascended the platform and replied on behalf of Major Bradley, who was unable to speak above a whisper, owing to a severe attack of quinsy.

A number of friends and State officers called to see the Governor elect at the Ormsby House parlors, among whom we noticed Miss Sue Robinson, Colonel A. B. Curry, Lieutenant Governor Slingerland, State Controller Hobart, State Printer Perkins, Senator Mills from White Pine, Assemblyman Tennant and others.

CHRISTMAS TREE AT EMPIRE.

While their more pretentious neighbors were celebrating the holidays with greater pomp and circumstance, the good people of Empire City had one of the most pleasant gatherings in the State, Christmas Eve - the occasion being enlivened by recitations, tableaux, and a dramatic entertainment given by the school children, under the direction of their teacher, L. S. Greenlaw.

PASSED THROUGH. - Jewett W. Adams and Joe Stewart passed through this city on Tuesday last, en route to the hot springs near Genoa. Adams is crippled with rheumatism and Stewart is ailing - and one of the horses in their team was sick. All three of the invalids are expected back this way on Saturday.

LAST CHANCE. - The County Commissioners particularly request that all claims against the County be presented to the Clerk of the Board before 10 o'clock on Saturday next. The present Board will hold its last meeting on that day.

LEGAL INTELLIGENCE.

U. S. District Court - Hon. E. W. HILLIER.

MONDAY, Dec. 26, 1870.

The United States vs. John H. Allen, arraigned for doing business without a license; leave to withdraw plea granted, and plea of guilty entered. Defendant fined \$1,000 (to stand committed until paid) and sentenced to imprisonment in a county jail for the term of six months. Stay of execution for 90 days, on filing bond in \$2,000.

United States vs. R. H. Taylor, arraigned for practicing law without a license; defendant pleaded guilty and was fined \$10.

United States vs. C. W. Johnson, arraigned for doing business without a license; plea of guilty entered, and defendant fined \$10.

United States vs. Morris Winkler, arraigned for doing business without a license; defendant entered a plea of guilty, and was fined \$1,000 (to stand committed until paid) and sentenced to imprisonment for six months in a county jail. Stay of execution granted for 90 days.

United States vs. Lucius C. Pease; default entered, and judgment granted as prayed for in complaint.

Trial jury excused for the term, and Court adjourned until Monday next, January 2, 1871.

District Court - Hon. SAMUEL H. WEBSTER. TUESDAY, Dec. 27, 1870.

State vs. James Holland, charged with assault with intent to commit murder; jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

Sun Han Tong Co. vs. Chas. Funkhouser; ordered placed on calendar.

WEDNESDAY, Dec. 28, 1870. In the matter of the estate of T. G. Smith, deceased; ordered, that final account be allowed, as prayed for in petition of Harriet M. Smith, executrix.

Trial jurors excused for the term.

STATE PRISONERS. - There are at present seventy prisoners confined in the Nevada State Prison - Fremont, from Humboldt county, having served out his term and been discharged on Tuesday last.

The prisoners are allowed five days each month for good behavior (or two months in each year), and at the expiration of their term are furnished with a suit of clothes and whatever funds may have accrued from "gate money."

B. Parsons for 20 years, and J. E. Chapman for 18 years - all from Christmas day, 1870.

CLERK OF ASSEMBLY. - Andy Whitford, who has served two sessions as Chief Clerk of the Assembly, is again in the field for the same position. Andy is well known to most of the members elect, and his uniform gentlemanly bearing and thorough knowledge of the duties of the position will weigh heavily in his favor.

TELEGRAPH OFFICE WANTED. - The inconvenience of walking half a mile or more to reach the telegraph office in the northern suburbs of the city is a matter of general remark and complaint. An office should be established near the Capitol - at least during the session of the Legislature.

FOR THE WARM SPRINGS. - Joseph N. Cowen is running a carriage daily to the Warm Springs Hotel and skating rink, leaving Carson street at 11 a. m., and 1 and 3 o'clock p. m. The rink is now in fine condition, and skates can be had at the hotel, a few steps from the lake.

MEAT AND DRINK. - T. Beer & Bro., at Empire City, have as fine a display of fat beef, pork and mutton, for the holidays, as we have seen, and their extensive grocery and liquor store is adjoining their market, there is not much danger of the people of that beautiful hamlet going hungry.

NEW MAP. - General Ord has forwarded to Governor Blaisdel a copy of Lieutenant Geo. M. Wheeler's "Military Map No. 1," which embraces the eastern tier of counties in this State from Idaho to Arizona, together with the greater portion of Lander, Pioche is in Nevada.

A GOOD SUGGESTION. - One of our local ministers, in his Christmas sermon, suggested the propriety of the Christian people of Carson devoting the present week to prayer - "owing to the great influx, at present, of the ungodly." Rough on the legislators.

Board of County Commissioners.

TUESDAY, December 27, 1870.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present - Commissioners Rice, Jones, and Driesbach, and Clerk T. J. Edwards.

Upon motion, the following claims against the county were allowed: H. S. Mason, salary as County Treasurer, \$375 10; E. B. Hall, for merchandise, \$11 50; Hancock & Co., for Justice's books, \$19 10; Wm. Fullstone, wood, \$27; M. M. Galge, cleaning sinks, \$12; D. E. Haskin, Constable's fees, \$35 25; Oleovich Bros., merchandise, \$42 15; H. S. Mason, rent of safe, \$100; H. H. Bense, Coroner's fees, \$64 05; William Wallace, specifications, etc., \$25; Jacob Slayter, merchandise, \$53 95; A. Waite, Justice's fees, etc., \$339 25; Koppel & Platt, clothing, \$25 50; P. Frisbie, board of paupers, \$23 15; A. B. Driesbach, house rent, \$12; A. B. Driesbach, merchandise for papers, \$271 33.

A resolution was adopted, ordering the County Auditor to draw his warrant on the General Fund in favor of Samuel Hodgkinson, for the sum of \$100, in full for services as night watchman of county property, for the year ending December 31, 1870.

The following named officers elect having filed official bonds, the same were approved by the Board: T. J. Edwards, County Clerk; Samuel D. King, County Auditor (three separate bonds); Wm. Patterson, District Attorney; Richard R. Parkinson, Justice of the Peace for Carson Township; Samuel H. Hodgkinson, Constable for Carson Township, and Patrick P. Kelly, Constable for Empire Township.

The Board then adjourned until 10 o'clock a. m. on Saturday next, December 31st.

CARSON THEATER. - "The School for Scandal" attracted a full house last evening, and the performance fully sustained the high character of Joseph Proctor's talented company. Walter Leman, as Sir Peter Teazle, threw his whole soul into the character and won frequent and hearty applause, while Miss Sue Robinson brought all her vivacity and characteristic spirit to bear as Lady Teazle, with most pleasing effect. Mr. Edmonds, as Joseph, and J. F. Cathart, as Charles Surface, proved themselves true artists, and the latter, though suffering from a severe cold, at once established himself as a favorite. Mrs. Candom, the original, could not have improved upon Mrs. E. F. Stewart's rendition of the character, and Miss Grace Hezlep, as Marid, was very pleasing. The interview between Sir Peter (Walter Leman) and Joseph Surface (Mr. Edmonds) kept the audience in a roar for several minutes, and taken as a whole the performance last night was the most pleasing Carson has witnessed this season. This evening, "Ingomar," in which Mr. Proctor will appear as the barbarian, and the amusing farce of the "Eton Boy."

STAY FOR PARDON. - In the case of John H. Allen, sentenced by the United States District Court to pay a fine of \$1,000 and be imprisoned six months for a violation of the revenue laws, a stay of execution was granted for ninety days, to give defendant time to make application to the President for pardon. While the officers could not do less than enforce the law, the law itself is too severe, and the case of Mr. Allen is one in which Executive clemency would be but justice. We learn that the officers of the Court will sign the petition to the President.

AQUITTED. - As will be seen by reference to the proceedings of the District Court, Jimmy Holland was acquitted of the charge of assault with intent to commit murder, in the shooting of William Denver, some time since.

ARRIVED. - Hon. T. V. Julien, of Humboldt county, arrived in this city last evening. Tom was defeated for the State Senate at the late election, but concluded he would come to Carson anyhow.

TRAINS OFF. - The Virginia and Truckee Railroad Company has taken off, temporarily, two engines, but passenger trains run as usual.
