Evening shades of Ardoise blue, oxidized silver, sea-green, etc., are adorned with lace and soft ruchings. In shapes, nearly all the dresses have pointed fronts, and square position basques at the back, when the basque itself is not deepened to form the upper skirt.

Suits are still worn the same as before, and the entire dress must correspond in color. The only exceptions to this rule are when the sack is black—either black velvet or some heavy cloth—or when a tunic of bright-colored cashmere is worn over a dark or black silk skirt.

Among the prettiest shapes of round hats is one similar to a lady's riding hat, with a crown considerably lower. Trimmed with rouleaux of faille and velvet on the crown, and handsome feathers added, this is a beautiful hat, and more of a hat than most of the Autumn shapes.

Some dresses of black are trimmed with white, which is one of the features of the season. Puffs are added to ruffles, and the richest fringes and passementeries added. The cashmere suits of black, plum-color, and "golden sand," are either embroidered by hand or trimmed with fringes and passementeries—no velvet.

We hear of a new fabric that may be worn and turned, and worn and turned again, called the mitrailleur; then there is the Vendean hat, the Bazaine beaver, and our Crig—a novelty in gentlemen's cravats. The emigre bonnet is a pretty, modest thing, quite close to the face, and not unbecoming in look. It is one of Eugenia's half-suggestive suggestions.

A rich dress of Carmelite gray has narrow frills not on its waves, with large bows of silk and satin placed at intervals. The upper skirt is long and bouffant, and is trimmed with a bias band of the silk, piped, and a beautiful fringe of silk and chenille alternating. Among black costumes, blue-black bears preference to the solid black, and these are adorned with fringe and velvet.

Among the novelties of the season is a handsome, half-fitting Polonaise of black velvet, trimmed with rich lace, headed by a passementerie. The pagoda sleeves are lined with satin, and are intended to be worn with a quilling of lace around the inside. Another cascade, for an elderly lady, has a looser shape, and is lined throughout with satin, and bordered with lace, headed by feather trimming. In street suits, a dress of satin de chine is made of two shades of brown, trimmed with folds of velvet added to the material. One of the new shades of invisible green is trimmed with quillings of faille of a darker shade.

The noticeable features of the flowers most lately imported are that they are copies of the largest and most showy flowers put forth by nature. Carnations, camellias and roses are the favorites. There are but few buds, and fewer leaves, the latter being flecked with brown, as if on the verge of frost-ruin. The prettiest roses, too, come under the head of those "just washed by a shower, which Mary to Anna conveyed," being loose-leaved and drooping. Shaded feathers, particularly in golden brown, are seen; some long and elegant plumes are used upon round hats, but ostrich tips are preferred, and exclusively used for bonnets.

A street dress of damson colored silk has a deep flounce, plaited a la Russe, and held at intervals with broad bands of velvet, a shade darker than the silk. Brandebourgs, or old-fashioned "frogs," are placed here and there upon the heading, which terminates in upright loops. The cascade is peculiar and novel, in being formed with pointed fronts, one side of the back being pointed and hanging, the other rounded and very much looped. Folded bretelles of velvet are trimmed with bullion fringe, with which the cascade is also bordered. A deep, folded sash of damson velvet divides the over-skirt at the back, and forms a fan-shaped postillion, standing directly out at the bottom of the waist. The cascade has simulated pockets of velvet, and mousquetaire sleeves.

"I will be in fashion, if I dye for it," said the ambitious belle, whose locks were not of the ruling tint; and dye she did.
