ST. MARY'S CHAPEL. The New Catholic Chapel on Lawrence Street will at last be finished completely. The regular pews have arrived and during the week will be put down and be ready for renting next Sunday. The total amount of expenses have been made out and were read to the people. The ground on which the chapel stands and the house on it cost \$13,000. The building of the chapel cost \$5,000, making the cost of the land and chapel \$18,000. Of this but \$1,000 has been contributed. There are, however, many persons who intend to contribute as soon as the pews are in and things are settled. The attendance at the chapel yesterday was very good and it is evident that two masses are necessary. Whether or not there will be depends upon Rev. Dr. Higgins, the provincial of the order, who will visit here next week. Dr. Higgins decides upon the number of priests who will be in the parish and will also make some suggestions. He may also officiate at the services in the church soon. Many of the parishioners would be delighted to have him do so.

THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY. A valuable paper read by Rev. Dr. Hart. Many prominent people present. Rev. Dr. Burdett Hart, the well known pastor-emeritus of the Grand Avenue Congregational church, before the New Haven Colony Historical society last evening was highly interesting. Dr. Hart's subject was: "The English Commonwealth." He spoke of the reign of Cromwell the Protector, and in his handling of the subject showed thorough research and exhaustive study of the subject. Prof. Baldwin, Prof. Hoppin and Thomas R. Trowbridge complimented Dr. Hart, and the society passed a hearty resolution of thanks. Among those present were Prof. Hoppin, Henry T. Blake, Rev. Dr. Phillips, Hon. James M. Townsend, Captain C. H. Townsend, General E. S. Greeley, ex-Governor Ingersoll, W. W. Farnam, Prof. Brewer, Charles L. Baldwin, Ell Whitney, General E. E. Bradley, Mr. Crutenden, Mr. Hugammar and others. President Baldwin announced that on the last Monday in January George L. Fox, rector of Hopkins Grammar school, will read a paper before the society on "The Recent Change in London's City Government and the Change in its Council." An informal reception was held in the parlors after the meeting and a collation was served. Dr. Hart, who addressed the society last evening, is so well known as a pastor and a writer that a well attended meeting resulted from the announcement that he was to speak. He is now a resident of Philadelphia.
