A MAINE FAMILY OF GIANTS.

Mother, Father and Ten Children All Over Six Feet Tall.

On the summit of a big hill in the eastern part of this town there was born and raised one of the most interesting families in Maine, that of William Fessenden, the railroad builder...

which are in front of lumber yards on the back streets, and requires the removal of old iron, &c., which is stacked up in front of many of the foundries and wagon yards.

Lieutenant Teeples of the Second police precinct told his men to be easy with those who were caught by the order and to allow them a reasonable time in which to take down their signs.

It is conservatively estimated that at least five hundred business men in the city will be seriously affected by the new order, many of whom, as they depend upon the patronage of the poorer classes, will be obliged to add increased hardships upon those classes at a time when they are least able to stand it.

There is probably not a "Big Rufe," who for eleven years has been the tallest policeman in the city. An average-sized man walking past the sergeant, Charles Walker, six feet two inches; Charles Walker, Ed Chaplin, James Coombs and Eugene Chaplin, six feet.

A globe correspondent climbed the long, steep hill and found William Fessenden to be quite an active man in full possession of his faculties, save for a slight deafness, although he has been a hard working man for seventy-nine years.

Mr. Fessenden told this interesting story:

"I was the father of eleven children. Perhaps you may consider them large, but they did not look very big to me, though I don't know but what Sarah was a good sized girl."

"My first child was William Austin. He was born in 1838. Austin is six feet six inches in height and has weighed two hundred and seventy pounds. He lives on a farm about two miles out of Bridgeton village at Sandy Creek."

"My second child was George Alnow, born in 1841. He was the shortest of the family. He was only six feet in height, and weighed two hundred pounds. When constructing a railroad in Ohio George jumped from a moving car and received injuries which caused his death."

"My third child was Thomas Pingree, born in 1842. He was six feet two inches and weighed considerably more than two hundred pounds. He is dead."

"The next was Sarah Elizabeth, born in 1844. She was more than six feet in height, and when a little girl she weighed two hundred and forty pounds. She was sensitive about her weight, and would not get on the scales when she became older. I guess you can put down her weight as more than three hundred pounds. She died about seven years ago."

"My fifth child was Edwin Palmer, born in 1850. He is six feet three inches, and weighs two hundred and forty pounds. He lives on a farm in this town."

"Stephen Alexander was born in 1852, and Parker Pingree in 1854. Stephen and Parker both died in 1884."

"The tenth child was Rufus Gardner, born in 1857. He is a police sergeant in Boston years ago."

"My last child was Adolphus Deering, born in 1858. He lives here on the farm. He is six feet seven inches, and weighs one hundred and ninety pounds."

In speaking of himself, Mr. Fessenden said:

"I was born in 1816. I am six feet in height, and never weighed over one hundred and ninety pounds. My ancestors were medium-sized persons. I have built country roads in different parts of Maine. I built the P. and O. railroad above Brownfield, the Eastern at Conway, a part of the Nashua, Acton and Boston, a railroad at Dunstable, Mass., and sixteen miles of the narrow gauge to Bridgeton. I began life with nothing and have held my own quite well."

In 1838 I married Melitabie F. Pingree. She was then twenty-four years old, stood over six feet in height in her stocking feet, and weighed over two hundred pounds. When I was courting her the boys used to plague me and say Melitabie was too big a girl for me to wait on."

"She was one of fourteen children, eight girls and six boys, all over six feet in height and over two hundred pounds in weight. They all lived to marry. When they assembled in one room they made the floor bend."

Most girls are slow of movement and often clumsy, but the Fessendens, Palmer excepted, are athletic. They were noted ball players, and the boys excelled in games and sports.

They were all good scholars, and their inclinations were to physical rather than mental occupations.

Financial.

Liquidations in Low Priced Issues Not Continued.

New York, Jan. 24.—The liquidations in the low priced issues were not continued to-day and as there was some covering of short contracts in these and other specialties the net result of the trading at the stock exchange was an advance of 1/4% per cent. London was a buyer of St. Paul, Louisville and Nashville and Denver and Rio Grande common, the loss in earnings of \$55,000 and partly to bear pressure third week of the current month having had no effect.

The treasury situation again came in for considerable discussion and the steady withdrawal of the treasury gold is creating nervy-ness. To-day \$2,780,000 was taken, making the total thus far this week \$6,288,000. Indications point to shipments of about \$7,000,000 on Saturday if the shippers can get full weight gold. The light weight coin will be turned into the banks so that in any event it is a losing game for the treasury department.

There were a few weak spots, especially in the industrials. Lead was particularly weak, falling from 26 1/2 to 25 1/2 for the common and from 8 1/2 to 8 for the preferred. The decline was attributed partly to liquidation and partly to bear pressure. Cordage made a new low record, the common falling to 5 and the first mortgages to 51. General Electric stock down 1/2 to 33 1/2. Chicago Gas 3/4 preferred 1 1/2 to 10 1/2. Chicago Gas 3/4 to 7 1/2. Laclede Gas 1 to 25 and Sugar 1 to 3 1/2. The last named declined in the face of heavy purchases by the room trader, who changed from this specialty yesterday.

In the last half hour of business there was renewed buying to cover short contracts and as a result the market closed steadier in tone. Lead rose 1/2 per cent. on the day. Tobacco 1/2. Manhattan 1/2 and Sugar and General Electric 3/4 per cent. The railway and miscellaneous bond market was weak. Sales were \$1,120,000.
