**UNION VETERAN UNION.**

A Novel Entertainment Last Evening—  
Incidents of Travel in the Form of a  
Lecture by Captain D. S. Thomas—A  
Crowding Success and an Impromptu Re-  
ception.  
Last evening the hall of General A.  
H. Terry Command, No. 3, Union Veter-  
an union, in the Insurance building, was  
crowded with members and their  
friends, the occasion being the reading  
of a paper by Captain D. S. Thomas  
entitled "Incidents of Travel." More  
tickets were disposed of than the hall  
would accommodate, and scores of lad-  
ies and gentlemen left the building.  
The reading occupied one hour, and  
although the heat was insufferable,  
not a person left their seat. Indeed,  
one rarely sees such rapt attention, and  
the perfect quiet of the packed audience  
and eager interest to catch every word,  
must have been quite flattering to the  
reader. Mr. Thomas has boiled down  
the adventures of a life time into a  
novel and entertaining lecture.  
He dwelt but briefly upon any one  
incident, and made but a brief tarry  
in any one locality. In quick succession  
he passes from one quarter of the  
globe to another, now roaming through  
the great cathedral capitals of Europe,  
again joining in a moonlight concert  
on the broad Atlantic, a moment later  
speeding down the Mississippi on a  
floating palace. The only disappoint-  
ment was that he made no allusion to  
his thirty-four balloon voyages, which  
comprise the most exciting incidents in  
his career. Later in the evening Mr.  
Thomas explained to a "Courier" re-  
porter that his experience as a re-  
mote balloonist formed a separate paper,  
requiring a full evening by itself. The  
subject last night was a novel one  
for a lecture, but it demonstrated what  
one man can do to entertain a miscel-  
laneous gathering, if he has the mat-  
erial to draw from and the brains to  
present it to an audience in an at-  
tractive manner.  
At the close Mr. Thomas was tendered  
an impromptu reception, which ended  
only after a large portion of the au-

**OBITUARY.**  
Death of H. William Schorer.  
H. William Schorer died at his home,  
14 Kossuth street, yesterday morning  
after a lingering illness. Mr. Schorer  
was one of the oldest and most respect-  
ed German citizens in this city. He  
was born at Frankfort-on-the-Main,  
Germany, in 1819 and came to New Ha-  
ven in 1847. Mr. Schorer when he first  
came to New Haven was employed for  
a great many years by Charles B. Lines,  
who was afterwards lieutenant governor  
of Kansas; then by Treat & Linsley,  
and later by the Shoninger Organ com-  
pany. He was very highly respected  
and will be missed by a large number  
of friends.

The deceased was a member of sev-  
eral societies, among them being Ger-  
mania lodge, I. O. O. F., Canton Aurora,  
uniformed rank, the German Aid soci-  
ety, Concordia, and he was also a char-  
ter member of Columbia lodge No. 15.  
He was one of the oldest and most  
esteemed Odd Fellows of New Haven  
and was held in special high regard  
from the fact that he was long promi-  
nent and active in the upbuilding of the  
lodges of which he was a member and  
the same is true of his connection with  
the other societies with which he was  
identified.  
He was a most devoted husband  
and father and in all the relations of  
life he leaves an honorable and un-  
blemished record. His health began to  
fail about two weeks before last Christ-  
mas and all that the best medical skill  
and loving, devoted care could do were  
unavailing to stay the progress of  
disease.  
Mr. Schorer leaves a widow, two sons  
and two daughters, Charles F. Schorer,  
a son, being in the wholesale grocery  
business on State street, this city, and  
Julius Schorer, the other son, being in  
business in New York. William Froh-  
lich, proprietor of the tonorial rooms  
on Center street, is a son-in-law of the  
deceased.  
The funeral will take place Sunday  
afternoon at his late home, 14 Kossuth  
street, at 3 o'clock. The funeral ser-  
vices will be conducted by the Rev. Mr.  
Slobke and the interment will be in the  
Evergreen cemetery.
