LOCAL NEWS.

The first shoot of the Connecticut State League of Trap-shooters will be held in New Haven on May 2. Quite a large delegation from the Colt club, Hartford, expects to attend. Mrs. Nora Russell-Haasche, the talented soloist, will be one of the artists who will sing at the concert to be given next Monday evening at Carnegie Music hall, New York city. She will sing the solo "Ahl Perido," by Beethoven. Rev. Patrick O'Brien of Ohio, who is to deliver the principal address at the temperance rally in the Grand opera house to-morrow night, is one of the best known clergymen in the west. He is a member of Forsythe post, G. A. R., of Toledo, and an honorary member of the Toledo Press club. He spoke in Bridgeport last night, it being his second lecture there this month. He will arrive in this city to-day and be the guest of Father Russell of St. Patrick's. This evening he will meet the local T. A. B. members in the rooms of the St. Aloysius society in the Register building on Chapel street. All are welcome to the rally and the committee extends a special invitation to the temperance organizations and G. A. R. posts to come and hear Father O'Brien. Judge W. C. Robinson will preside.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION. Removal of the Commercial Department Again Discussed. The regular meeting of the board of education was held last evening. Eli Whitney, Jr., presiding in the absence of President Avis. Thomas Hooker and Walter J. Connor were also absent from the meeting. The committee on special construction introduced several recommendations, which aroused considerable discussion. The first was the proposition that the Carter house on York square which is the house nearest to the Boardman Manual Training High school, should be fitted up in a manner suitable for the reception of the commercial department of the high school, and that that department hereafter be connected with the Boardman school. Mr. Whitney stated that there was no particular objection to the matter from Mr. Thomas, principal of the Hillhouse High school, and that it seemed to be the most desirable manner of dealing with the commercial department. It was further stated that it would cost about \$1,500 to fit it up in suitable shape for the reception of the department. Mr. Betts did not think that it would pay to fit up the house, which, he said, was not in good condition. Mr. Asher thought the board should find out more about the details connected with the removal. Mr. Whitney said the board would not concern themselves with the details, but would leave the teachers them to work them out.

In the discussion it was stated that the total expenses of the Boardman school, when it should be in full running order, would be \$40,000 per year as against \$30,000 for the Hillhouse High school, and that the Boardman school would be by far the most expensive school ever established in this school district. It was further stated that Principal Mather would need eleven new teachers next year, and Principal Thomas one new teacher. After some more discussion the recommendation of the committee on special construction was laid on the table, and the building committee was instructed

to look over the Carter building and get estimates for fitting it up for the reception of the commercial department. Another recommendation was then read that the athletic associations of the high schools be allowed to hold meetings in the high school buildings, a teacher always to preside. Mr. Betts opposed this, but it was passed. The superintendent and the committee on special instruction were given power to engage a drawing teacher in the high school and an assistant in drawing in the Boardman school, who shall also understand clay moulding. The name of Mrs. Alice D. Porter was proposed upon the recommendation of Prof. Albert S. Cook of the English department, Yale college, as a desirable candidate for the position of teacher of English in the high school. It was stated that she could be secured for \$1,800 per year. The bids for the George street school were reported awarded as follows: John Hogan, mason work, \$23,772; David H. Clark, carpenter work, \$17,797; Rourke Bros., heating and ventilating, \$5,897; plumbing and gas fitting, D. W. Kelly, \$3,263. The fire commissioners were given permission to place a fire bell on the tower of the Strong school in Fair Haven, provided it is not rung during sessions of the school. Commencement day was fixed for Thursday, June 26, and the clerk was instructed to procure the Hyperion for that date. Principal Camp of Dwight school was allowed pay at his regular rate for half the time of his absence on account of illness. Miss Georgiana Norman was allowed \$50 as compensation for extra duties during the illness of Mr. Camp. It was voted to observe the usual custom of granting a half holiday to the schools on Arbor day, May 3. Miss A. Lillian Blackman was appointed stenographer for the ensuing year at a salary of \$600. Mrs. Parnell Improves. Bordentown, N. J., April 26.—The condition of Mrs. Parnell was more favorable to-day than at any other time since the assault. She experienced no convulsions to-day, and has taken considerable nourishment. Dr. Shipps seemed quite hopeful of her recovery, but said an unfavorable change might occur at any moment.
