WEATHER RECORD.

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT. OFFICE OF THE CHIEF. OFFICE OF THE WEATHER BUREAU. WASHINGTON, D. C., May 6, 1895, 8 P. M. Forecast for Tuesday—For Rhode Island and Connecticut: Fair, warmer, southerly winds, becoming variable. The area of high pressure continues over the Atlantic states central in Virginia. The pressure is also high on the Pacific coast. The pressure is low in the extreme northwest and there is a storm center of slight energy north of Montana. The barometer has fallen in New England and risen in the upper lake region, the extreme northwest and Texas. The temperature has risen rapidly in New England and fallen in the Ohio valley and lake region. Local rains have occurred in the Atlantic and Gulf states and generally in the upper lake region and upper Mississippi valley. Local rains will occur in the south Atlantic and Gulf states and showers in lake regions. The temperature will probably rise slightly on the middle Atlantic coast and fall in the lower lake region.

GRAVES OF THE SOLDIERS.

To be Decorated by Sons of the Revolution on Memorial Day. It has hitherto been the custom for the veterans of '61-'65 when decorating graves on Memorial day to decorate not only the graves of their own comrades, but also those of soldiers of the revolutionary and Mexican wars, but so many of their own numbers are being added to the honored dead that at the last national observance of the G. A. R. it was voted to decorate only their own comrades' graves. The Society of the Sons of the Revolutionary War has, however, voted to attend to the rest. Committees will be appointed from General Gould Silliman branch of Sons of Revolution to mark the graves and on Memorial day they will be decorated. The ladies of Mary Silliman branch of D. R.
