MEETING OF DENTISTS. Program for the State Association, May 21 and 22. Dr. Charles McManus of Hartford, Dr. William H. Rider of Danbury and Dr. C. C. Barker of Meriden form the executive committee of the Connecticut State Dental association, and they have arranged a program for the thirty-first annual meeting of the association at Phalanx hall, Hartford, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 21 and 22, that all the members will find interesting. At 10:30 in the morning the board of censors will meet to pass on applications for membership, and the meeting of the association will be called to order at 11 o'clock. After the transaction of some routine business the president, Dr. Charles P. Graham of Middletown, will deliver his annual address. Reports will be made by the committees on the Wells memorial and on beneficiary scholarships. Topics for discussion during the two days have been selected as follows: "Is not operative dentistry liable to the same injury from too prevalent use of plastic stoppings, as occurred to prosthetic practice from the introduction of vulcanite?" discussion opened by Dr. E. S. Gaylord of New Haven; "Practical five-minute talks on questions arising in daily practice," discussion opened by Dr. L. C. Taylor, who will talk on "Dental Education." "What is the most satisfactory antiseptic and best method for root canal sterilization?" discussion opened by Dr. C. C. Barker of Meriden; "Can alveolar-dental abscess arise after complete sterilization and obliteration of canal by an impervious filling, and if so, from what causes?" discussion opened by Dr. Clinton W. Strong of Bridgeport; "What are the best methods of diagnosis of pulp calcification in its several forms? To what extent does the process demand treatment and how shall it be treated, (a) with respect to its prevention and (b) remedially?" Dr. N. J. Goodwin of Hartford will read a paper on "Partial Crowns," and a paper on "Dental Students" will be read by Dr. W. H. Rider of Danbury. Items of business to be acted on are: Names of members in arrears to be given by the treasurer to the board of censors, who may cause them to be stricken from the roll, or if in their judgment it is best, remit the dues; remitting dues of any member at his option, who shall reach a certain age limit, not stated, perhaps sixty years; establishing a committee to examine all candidates for beneficiary scholarships; and to report the best fitted to the president for appointment; establishing a committee on necrology; creating an assistant secretary. Tuesday evening will be given up to informal talk, examination of exhibits, music and a collation.

May Pay a Larger Salary. It has been decided by the joint committee of the board of education to offer a salary of \$3,500 per year to the new school superintendent, with \$300 for horse hire. It was found that this advance would be necessary in order to get the most desirable men to consider an offer. Forty Hours Devotion Ended. The forty hours' devotion which opened at St. Mary's church at 10:30 last Sunday morning, was concluded yesterday morning with a solemn high mass, celebrated by Rev. Father Harrigan, formerly pastor of the church, Father Fowler, deacon, and Father Murray, sub-deacon. Father Higgins is taking the place of Father Lilley of the church, who is at present attending a mission in Philadelphia.

TRYING TO OUST HIS WIFE. Summary proceedings instituted against Conrad F. Ulrich. Summary proceedings instituted yesterday against Conrad F. Ulrich of this city by Herman S. Ulrich of Hartford in the Hoedley building, next Tuesday. The papers in the case were drawn yesterday morning by Attorneys Adams and Bishop. Conrad Ulrich is supposed to live at 228 Mansfield street. As a matter of fact, however, the property is occupied by his wife and children, with whom he does not live. Until recently this house was the abode of Mr. and Mrs. Ulrich. Conrad Ulrich is an engraver and is employed at the Marlin Rifle factory. Some time since he brought suit for divorce through Attorneys Mathewson and Asher. Since that time he has endeavored to have his wife leave the house. Mrs. Ulrich has persistently refused to do this and has refused to live in the rooms offered her by her husband in what she believes to be an objectionable part of the city. But Ulrich, it is stated, was determined to get his wife out of the house, so he transferred it to a Mrs. Mary Tiffany, who in turn, has endeavored to have her sister-in-law, who seeks to turn his sister-in-law out, alleging that the rent has not been paid. Attorney P. W. Chase, counsel for the plaintiff, will appear before Justice Spier and will oppose the proceedings. The plaintiff is a well known Hartford resident.

DEATH OF A. M. BARROWS. Suddenly Expired at Mill River From Heart Disease. Albert M. Barrows, a traveling salesman for Healy & Bigelow of this city, expired suddenly of heart disease last Sunday night at Mill River, Mass., where he had stopped over night. The cause of death is believed to have been heart disease. The deceased was a member of Harmony lodge of Odd Fellows of this city, and leaves a wife and two sons, one of whom is employed by Scholtes & Pohlman, while the other is a traveling salesman. Withdrew His Opposition. Edwin E. Sanford, who last year petitioned for a license to sell liquor at the Merwin Point house, and whose application was decided against by Judge S. O. Prentice last year, presented another application a few days ago, but upon learning that the restraints were out in force, the application was withdrawn yesterday.
