**MANDAMUS WRIT REFUSED**

MEMORANDUM IN THE CASE OF ANSONIA VS. JUDGE STUDLEY.

Judge Prentiss finds the Borough of Ansonia guilty of Recklessness and Negligence—Numerous Delays—Judge Studley's Forbearance and Courtesy.

Judge S. O. Prentice yesterday refused to grant a writ of mandamus to compel Judge J. P. Studley to file a finding of facts in the case of J. B. Manley against the borough of Ansonia, application for which was made by the defendants. It will be remembered that Manley brought suit against the borough of Ansonia for land damages, and that his suit was successful, judgment being rendered for a considerable sum.

The opinion rendered by Judge Prentice in the case charges the rector (the borough of Ansonia) with inexcusable remissness and negligence in the matter and does not find anything to warrant the intervention of the superior court. The opinion in full is as follows: "Granting that this court has all the power in the premises claimed for it by the rector a question which I have not found it of any to decide, I am nevertheless of the opinion, and find, that it has been guilty of such laches that it has lost all right to claim from Judge Studley, as a matter of right, a finding such as is asked for."

The rector filed its substitute proposed finding September 11, 1894. This was nineteen months subsequent to the trial, fully ten months after the original proposed finding had been withdrawn for substitution, and eight months lacking only a few days, since any communication of any kind whatever upon the subject passed between the judge and the counsel. This last communication was the letter of Judge Studley to Mr. Holden, dated January 30, 1894, and its formal acknowledgment on the following day. Whether this letter is regarded as a revival of a lapse of right and not as a mere expression of willingness of the judge, in the exercise of his discretion, to extend his judicial courtesy after a lapse of right, or whether it is regarded as a suggestion of the court under a permission to file a substitute proposed finding within an intermediate time, which are as favorable constructions as can be placed on the confessed situation—the eight months of delay and silence which ensued cannot be explained upon any basis of reasonable conduct. The inexcusable delay and silence deprived the rector of all standing before Judge Studley upon a claim of right. By the rector placed itself in a position, if it had not previously done so, where it could only rely upon a continuation of a courtesy on the part of Judge Studley, which had in the history of the case, since its trial, been meted out to it to overflowing measure.

"It is suggested that Judge Studley by his courtesies and forbearance prior to January, 1894, had invited the rector's delay and thus practically sanctioned and legalized the pursuit of it by its own course in the matter. This claim is too specious to be even plausible. The contention resolves itself into nothing but, else than this: That a judge's past forbearance of the infraction of rules, and his condonation of lax procedure on the part of the counsel, suffice to clothe present violations with all the dignity and force of rights. What quasi obligations the extension of forbearance and courtesies by a judge to counsel may, as between man and man, impose upon the exercise of his discretion in his subsequent conduct, is one thing. To say that the exercise of forbearance on the part of a judge acting upon the rights of others, vests the recipient with a legal right, pure and simple, to subsequent forbearance in wrong doing is quite another thing. Courts do not exist to compel the exercise the courtesies or amenities of life. Their province is to enforce rights. When one puts himself into a position where he surrenders his rights and has for his reliance in their stead only another's courtesy he must do his complaining elsewhere than in court.

"But these suggestions aside, I fall to discover anything in the history of the case, unusual though it be, to give support to the claim that Judge Studley had invited the rector's course of action. He had indeed gone to the extreme in accommodating counsel, but what there was to invite, or impliedly sanction an eight months' delay, without a word to him, especially when this delay followed a letter from him prompting action, is not apparent to me.

"The rector has no grievance justifying the intervention of this court."
