INJUNCTION WAS GRANTED

WEST HAVEN POLICE WILL NOT BE APPOINTED AT PRESENT. Several Divorces Granted by Judge Prentice—Decree Granted to the Wife of Dr. Axtelle of Waterbury—Other Interesting Court News of the Day. Late yesterday afternoon in the superior court, civil side, Judge Prentice, granted on motion of David Platt and others of West Haven a temporary injunction restraining the selection of the town of Orange from appointing fifteen policemen for the borough of West Haven, in accordance with a vote passed at a recent town meeting. The dispute is over a question as to whether the selection or the board of burgesses have the right to appoint the policemen. In a few days a hearing on a dissolution of the injunction will take place.

Judge Prentice at the short calendar session of the superior court yesterday granted to Mary Axtelle, the wife of the well known Waterbury physician, a decree for divorce on the ground of desertion and infidelity. With the decree was awarded \$7,400 alimony and the custody of the plaintiff's ten-year-old daughter, Mary Axtelle. It was shown that the plaintiff was married to Dr. Axtelle in New York, November 11, 1882, and that three years later the husband deserted her. The charge of infidelity was also substantiated by deposition of Dr. Frederick A. Goodwin and testimony of Henry A. Blakeman, a private detective. Mary O'Reilly of this city was granted a divorce from Michael O'Reilly of Wells, Hamilton county, New York, on the ground of desertion, and the plaintiff was allowed to resume her maiden name of Wakely. The couple were married in 1870 and the desertion occurred in January, 1892.

Julia Suarez of Waterbury was granted a divorce from Ambrosius Suarez of parts unknown on the ground of desertion and the custody of three minor children was awarded the plaintiff. Catherine Van Dine of this city was granted a divorce from Charles E. Van Dine of Brooklyn on the ground of desertion. The couple were married in March, 1891. Octavia Turcotte of Howard Avenue has withdrawn his defense to his wife's petition for a divorce. The case was on the ex-parte list to be heard yesterday, but it was postponed until next week.

OFFICER CURRAN WAS SICK.

Special Meeting of Police Commissioners Held Yesterday Afternoon. A special meeting of the board of police commissioners was held yesterday afternoon to consider charges unbecoming an officer preferred by J. W. Ballou, the Kimberly Avenue druggist, against Patrolman William R. Curran. It was alleged that the officer went into the complainant's drug store several days ago under the influence of liquor. In his own behalf officer Curran claimed that on the night in question he was suffering from a severe attack of cramps, and on his way home in the morning, after his work was done he took an extra large dose of French brandy, and not being used to intoxicating liquors he was affected by it. He stopped in Ballou's drug store to telephone to headquarters that he was sick, and while there the liquor took effect. Ballou was loath to appear against the officer, after hearing the circumstances of the case, but having made the complaint he was obliged to do so. In executive session the board decided that while there were many extenuating circumstances in connection with the case it would not be well to allow it to pass without notice, and decided to fine the officer for the time he had been under suspension, about ten days. Curran will resume duty to-night.

Electric Car Ordinance.

It is ordained by the Court of Common Council of the City of New Haven: Section 1. No street railway car shall move or be moved through any street or part of any street within a radius of one mile from the City Hall at a speed greater than that of the rate of ten miles per hour, except that at a speed greater than that of twelve miles an hour. Section 2. Upon approaching a crossing, or an intersecting street upon level and descending ground within a radius of one mile of City Hall, the motorist shall sound the power and have the car under control until the opposite crossing has been passed. Section 3. No street railway car shall be allowed to pass another car standing on a parallel track in the same street to receive or deliver passengers without coming to a full stop to allow the safe ingress and egress of such passengers. Section 4. No person (except an employe when necessary) shall be allowed to stand on the platform of any street railway car propelled by motive power other than horses, with the motorist or person having control of the speed of such car. Section 5. Every street railway company operating street railway cars propelled by any motive power other than horses, shall equip every such car with good and effective fenders and of such design and type as shall be recommended by the Committee on Ordinances and approved by the Court of Common Council. Section 6. Every motorist or person having control of any street railway car shall post copies of this ordinance in conspicuous places in each of its cars so that they can be conveniently and plainly seen and read by such company's employes, and shall also post in a conspicuous place in each of its cars a copy of said ordinance so that it can be conveniently and plainly seen and read by the patrons of such street railway company. Section 7. Any motorist or person violating any of the provisions of Sections one, two, three, four and six, and any member of any corporation who causes any motorist to violate the provisions of any of said Sections, shall be fined not less than one nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense. Section 8. Any street railway corporation or person operating street railways within the City of New Haven who shall violate any of the provisions of Sections five and seven shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense. Section 9. Any street railway corporation or person operating street railways within the City of New Haven who shall violate any of the provisions of Sections five and seven shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense. Section 10. This ordinance, except Section five, shall take effect thirty days after its passage and Section five shall take effect three months after its passage and its enforcement is recommended by the committee on Ordinances and approved by the Court of Common Council.
