GREAT WILD WEST SHOW

AND CONGRESS OF ROUGH RIDERS—BUFFALO BILL.

An immense Concourse of People at the Afternoon Show—Another Multitude in the Evening—A Great Show. Hundreds of children of all ages, from the little tot just entering school to the young man or miss who is about to graduate from the high school or college, received a great deal of instruction yesterday afternoon and last night. It was a good school and the ten thousand people who were on the grounds yesterday afternoon at Buffalo Bill's Wild West show and Congress of Rough Riders of the World thoroughly appreciated it, as was manifested by their exclamations of delight, surprise, at some of the remarkable feats performed, and the applause which they gave as appreciative of what was done in the arena. Yesterday was the first time that the school children of New Haven had had an opportunity of witnessing the riding of the soldiers of all nations of whom they study and read about day after day. There were cavalrymen from Great Britain, the Royal Irish Lancers, a detachment from Germany, one from France, and they were good horsemen, too; a band of Bedouins, numbers of American Indians, and by no means the least, a detachment from the Seventh United States Cavalry, the pride of the west department.

At 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon the famous cowboy band opened the exhibition with a selection of the Star Spangled Banner, but not, though, until after the announcer, who was cavalcading from Great Britain, the Royal Irish Lancers, a detachment from Germany, one from France, and they were good horsemen, too; a band of Bedouins, numbers of American Indians, and by no means the least, a detachment from the Seventh United States Cavalry, the pride of the west department. At 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon the famous cowboy band opened the exhibition with a selection of the Star Spangled Banner, but not, though, until after the announcer, who was cavalcading from Great Britain, the Royal Irish Lancers, a detachment from Germany, one from France, and they were good horsemen, too; a band of Bedouins, numbers of American Indians, and by no means the least, a detachment from the Seventh United States Cavalry, the pride of the west department.

Grand Opera House.

Notwithstanding the scorching heat of yesterday large audiences were present at the Grand Opera house, which is awarded the palm as being the coolest and most comfortable place in the heated season.

The Rentz Santley Novelty and Burlesque company is one of the best vaudeville companies that has visited us for some time, every member being a star performer.

The opening burlesque, "A Shakespearean Carnival," introduces a bevy of pretty girls, whose singing adds much to its success. Collins and Collins do a neat song and dance act. Clara Simpson captures the audience with her "Bowery Girl." Leslie and Tenley are good Irish comedians. Rowe and Rentz do a very funny act on the trapeze. The living pictures are of no mean order and compare favorably with others that have been seen here before. HURLED AGAINST A FREIGHT CAR.

George A. Lane of Wallingford Thrown From a Rapidly Moving Train—He Will Not Recover. Bridgeport, May 31.—A railroad accident occurred in this city this evening in which three men were badly hurt, and one of them lies at the general hospital dying.

When the west bound accommodation train leaving New Haven at 5:30 and due in this city at 6:15, was entering this city at a point opposite the factories of Wheeler & Wilson. The train was running at a fair rate of speed. George A. Lane, the messenger in charge of the Adams Express car, which is attached to the train, was standing at the door of his car waving his hand at an acquaintance. As the train passed a switch siding on which there were several freight cars standing, Lane reached out and waved his hand. A door on one of the freight cars had not been securely fastened, and the packing of the goods in the car was so poorly done that the goods pushed open the door. This door struck Lane, and the unfortunate man was hurled out of his car and thrown down between his rapidly moving train and the stationary freight cars. The passenger train was stopped, and Lane's companions hurried back to the spot. Lane was horribly injured. His skull was crushed, and he was badly cut and bruised. Still unconscious he was removed to the general hospital in this city, where it was found that he is internally injured. There is little hope of his recovery.

The blow against the freight car door caused it to protrude still further, and as the rest of the passenger train sped by the sides of two cars were badly damaged. Two Italians sat with their elbows extending over the sills of the windows, and they were struck with great force. Each had an arm broken. Lane resides in Wallingford. He is about twenty-five years of age, and is a very popular messenger. His parents at Wallingford were at once notified, and Wm. F. Lane, his father, hurried to this city. He is connected with the New Haven Journal and Courier as Wallingford correspondent.
