## EXHIBITION OF DRAWINGS

EXCELLENT WORK BY DRAWING PUPILS IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Much Praise Due to the Instruction of Misses Skinner and Henry—Mechanical and Free Hand Drawing—Development of Artistic Taste Aimed at—Water Color Studies From Still Life—Sketches From Life Pose.

The exhibition of mechanical and free hand drawing at the Hillhouse High school has already attracted considerable attention both from the excellence of the quality of the work and the admirable manner in which it is arranged. Miss Skinner and Miss Henry, who have instructed the pupils in drawing, are to be praised for the degree of progress and maturity which is exhibited in the work of the pupils, considering the time they have been under instruction. The work exhibited has been carefully selected, and an effort has been made to show the best work that each pupil can do. The work is optional, except with young ladies fitting to be teachers. The school gives thirty-five minutes per week to drawing, which work is supplemented by a weekly home sketch. Next year in the first and second year classes there will be the same period and arrangement as at present. But the junior and senior classes will have a double period, and the home sketch will not be required. All the work exhibited is the work of the regular morning classes, with the exception of the sketches from the life pose and water color still life studies.

The course begins with free outline drawings of models and objects such as the double cone, hexagonal prism, Greek cross, candlestick, tea pot, books, flasks and vases. These are studied singly for perspective principles and are pleasingly combined and grouped, thus developing principles of composition. Then come similar objects studied as to light and shade, singly and groups, in pencil and pen and ink. In the first of the home sketches are applications of the principle of perspective and composition found in model and common objects and in the second year furniture and interiors of rooms are studied.

In this session considerable attention is given to drawing sprays of flowers and leaves, fruit, vegetables, in short, nature study. Pupils are encouraged to bring in out of door sketches of simple buildings and bits of scenery.

A feature of the work this year is the reproduction of historic ornament in Egyptian, Assyrian, Greek, Moorish and Gothic styles, in water color, with original design based upon these historic motives. Considerable interest is manifested in this line of work. To a certain extent this work has been supplemented by talks on the history of art, the same great value of this work in historical ornament is the training of the taste in the appreciation of beautiful forms and colors.

A few examples of charcoal work are shown by senior and junior students, but it is impossible to develop the subject satisfactorily through lack of time. With the double period promised for next year it is hoped that much more may be accomplished in this medium.

The work in mechanical drawing consists of drawings of geometric solids singly and combined and a few simple mechanical details. Much interest is felt in this line of work, but the subject could be much more satisfactorily handled with a longer lesson period. As it is the pupils barely get out their work and become interested in a problem before it has to be put aside. One feature of the exhibit is some simple free sketches from life pose made by pupils in optional afternoon practice. There are some thirty students selected for this work because of their interest in the work and their good general standing, no student eligible to work in afternoon classes whose general standing is unsatisfactory.

Another line of afternoon class work water color still life is very creditable sketches being shown under this head. The aim throughout has been to carry the work in simple strong additional lines and to base it upon the newest and latest oil method. It is hoped that the public will avail themselves of the opportunity to view the work, especially the parents of the pupils and the grammar grade pupils soon to enter the high school, as it gives a class idea of what is being accomplished in this line of work.

Miss Skinner and Miss Henry will be pleased to explain the work to all visitors of the exhibit through this and Friday afternoons and it is expected that specimens of the drawing and color of the New Haven schools will be exhibited in Denver at the meeting of the National Educational association. The exhibit is on the fourth floor.

## LAST RECITAL OF THE SEASON

Given by Pupils of the Dessauer-Troostwyk School of Music Last Evening.

The last recital of the season by the pupils of the Dessauer-Troostwyk School of Music was given yesterday afternoon at Steiner hall. A new system of ventilation has been adopted and was much appreciated by the large audience present.

The recital opened with a Sonatine by Schubert played by Jules Goodman and Willis Van der Brake, showing decided musical ability and careful training, as did also the second number, a Marche by Alard, played by Master George Mower.

Numbers there was a Concerto Mazourka by Schubert, for piano, in which Miss Mabel Hepburn had the opportunity to show her fine technique to good advantage.

The serenade by Herrmann for three violins and viola, played by Mrs. Cass, the Misses Molly Steiner, Harriet Street and Mr. Strauss, is a fine composition and was well rendered.

The flute solo, Fantaisie by Hemenayer, played by Mr. H. Foreman, was excellently played and very much appreciated.

Miss Molly Steiner did herself and her instructor great credit in the rendering of the Elegie by Mussa. Her intonation was perfect and her conception fine.

Miss Alice Cheney is a very gifted young pianiste and played the waltz in A flat by Moszkowski with a delicate expression and clean technique. Master Orville Bailey, a boy only nine years old, performed a difficult gavotte by Bohm in a truly artistic manner. This boy is certainly a genius and a brilliant future is predicted for him by his instructor, Mr. Troostwyk.

Le Grand Duo de Concert for two violins, by Leonard, was played by Messrs. Troostwyk and Leslie Vaughan as the last number.

This composition has in it a degree of sadness and was played in a soulful and expressive manner with the broad tone and finished technique which characterizes the virtuoso.

New Haven should be justly proud of the progress made by this school, which is only in its third year, having been incorporated in October, 1893.
