THE FIRST GOLF MATCH

EVER PLAYED IN NEW HAVEN STATED YESTERDAY.

Pateron and Graham Play a Close and Interesting Game Over the New Course—A Foursome Followed Which Was Also Keenly Contested—To-day's Match.

What might be termed the first golf competition that ever took place in New Haven and if we mistake not also the first that has ever been played in this state, took place yesterday afternoon over the course of the New Haven Golf club, between W. Pateron and P. W. Graham. The players are both experts at the game and got their early training in Scotland, where the game claims its birthplace, Pateron having played on the famous links of North Berwick and Graham on the well known famous course at Forfarshire. Although neither has played since coming to this country, some years ago, they have not forgotten how to use their clubs to advantage, nor yet the knack of hitting the ball. The game is one which when learned when one is young can never be forgotten. A player out of practice may get rusty, but once a player ever a player, and this maxim was clearly evinced by yesterday's exhibition. The course is now almost completed and to-day R. D. Pryde, who is superintending the work, expects to have the flags in position, showing where the putting green are. The gentlemen who are interested in the game are confident that golf will have a great future in this city and that when the fall comes round the links will be well patronized by both lady and gentleman players. In the meantime they extend a hearty welcome to all who are in any way interested in golf to visit the links and have game. Mr. Joseph T. Whitteley, the president, will gladly furnish any information concerning the aims and objects of the club and will also be pleased to receive applications for membership.

THE MATCH.

The match between Pateron and Graham was close and interesting, as the appended score will show. Pateron won by two holes, although there was only one stroke of difference between their totals, which were:

THE FOUR SOME GAME.

At the conclusion of the above match a foursome took place between W. Pateron and James Mustarde on the hand and R. D. Pryde and P. W. Graham on the other. When the players reached the fifth hole darkness had set in and the game had to be postponed. The first hole went to Pryde and Graham, the score being 8 to 9. The next hole was halved, both sides being in with 6 each. Playing for the next hole Pryde and Graham got into difficulties and scored 11 to their opponents 7, thus squaring the game. Pateron and Mustarde got ditched in the next and scored 9 to their opponents 5, making them again one up on the game. The next hole was won by Pryde and Graham by 4 to 6, leaving them two up and at this stage play had to be abandoned, owing to the darkness. The scores were:

TO-DAY'S MATCH.

The championship match which had to be postponed last Saturday on account of the rain, will be played to-night at 8:30, the players being William Pateron and James Brown against R. D. Pryde and P. W. Graham. All four are experts at the game and an interesting competition should be the result.

THE MURDERER COLOMBE.

Under orders from Coroner Mix, Joseph Colombe, the French-Canadian brute who clubbed his wife into insensibility and had bones and flesh almost on pulp, is held in the county jail on the charge of murder by Sheriff Spiegel.

The murderer was brought down from the jail yesterday morning to the coroner's office, where he answered all of Mr. Mix's questions quietly and without attempt to deny his guilt, but says that he would never have done what he did if he had not been drunk.

The coroner will continue the examination of witnesses to-day, when the Bethany officers and all of those who know anything about the case will be summoned to his office.

The autopsy upon the body of Mrs. Colombe was made yesterday by Medical Examiner M. C. White, assisted by two other physicians. Nothing can be given out by the medical examiner concerning the wounds except under orders from the state attorney, but it was learned that in the autopsy about the only bones which were not announced as having been broken Thursday—the ribs—were found to be shattered in several places.

Colombe will have to be taken out to Bethany again to be put to sleep upon the charge of murder in the first degree. He was bound over for a breach of the peace by Justice S. R. Woodward on Wednesday and a preliminary hearing will be held before this justice probably on Tuesday. He will unquestionably bind Colombe over to the October term of the superior court.

No Agreement Entered Into.

Philadelphia, July 19.—H. Laussat Geyekin, president of the University of Pennsylvania A. A., to-day denied the report that Pennylvania had entered into an athletic agreement with Harvard, covering all branches of athletics and to last for a term of years. He said: "We have made no such arrangement up to date, and I know of no pending agreements to the effect. Our relations with Harvard cover only football, although we should be pleased to come to some understanding about an athletic agreement."

Killed by Lightning.

Lewiston, Ill., July 19.—A cloud burst in this vicinity last night did great damage to growing crops. Samuel Shaw, a well known citizen, was killed by lightning. Several thousand feet of the narrow gauge railway was swept away by the downpour of rain.

Mozart Lodge, No. 193—A Big Meeting.

A very large number of the members of Mozart lodge No. 193, of the New England Order of Protection, was held last evening, the occasion being the official visit of the grand warden and suite to the lodge. The grand officers were presented by Deputy Henze and were received by the warden and lodge in the honor due their station.

Four members were initiated, the initiatory work being performed in a very efficient manner by the regular officers of the lodge. A committee was appointed to confer with Humboldt lodge of Waterbury and arrange for a joint picnic as soon as possible.

Under the head of "Good of the Order" addresses were called for. Grand Warden Deming, in responding, praised the lodge highly for their good attendance, their perfect ritualistic work and the great gain they had made in their membership during the past six months. He was followed by Past Warden Chatterton of Elm Tree lodge in a short address. Junior Past Warden Melntosh of Charter Oak lodge, in speaking said that there was no other instance of such great and rapid growth as that of Mozart lodge in the entire history of the New England Order of Protection. He was followed by Deputy Henze and Supreme Representative Stutz, after which the meeting was brought to a close.

After the lodge session the party adjourned to the parlors of the lodge room where a superb collation was served.

Connecticut Jersey Cattle Breeders.

Meriden, July 19.—An erroneous impression has gone forth that on account of the failure of the State Agricultural society to hold a fair this year there would be no fall meeting of the Connecticut Jersey Cattle Breeders' association. The association will hold its annual meeting here with the Meriden Agricultural society's fair, and has voted to offer prizes as follows: Class 1, best Jersey cows, first prize \$20, second \$10, third \$5; class 2, best herd, bull and six or not less than four cows in milk, first prize \$35, second \$20, third \$10. All animals entered for competition must be not less than nine months old.

Turkish Troops Defeat d.

Sofia, July 19.—A serious fight has occurred on the Turko-Macedonian frontier between a force of insurgents' stated to have numbered 500 and a body of Turkish troops. The latter were defeated with a loss of 600 men.

Died of His Injuries.

New London, July 19.—The accident to the Ericson Wednesday resulted to-night in the death of "Jack" Strinsky, junior engineer, whose home is in Dubuque, Ia., one of the men scalded. This morning he suffered from a shock but rallied, and at noon his early death was not looked for. Before 6 o'clock this evening death came.
