CHILDREN NEGLECTED.

Many Cases Recently Reported to Agent Preston of the Organized Charities. Numerous cases of neglected children come to Agent Preston of the Organized Charities during the summer months and with his other work he is pressed for time to investigate them. It has come to Mr. Preston's notice that a baby in East street is left by its mother, who works in a hotel, to be cared for by a sister who gets drunk and neglects the infant.

A boy fourteen years of age in Fair Haven, who has a physical infirmity, is neglected and compelled to sleep in the cellar. A girl in Fair Haven, an orphan, who received a pension, her father having been a soldier in the late war, is reported to have been imposed upon by the family with whom she is living. She turns the pension money over to the family, and it is said, does not receive a fair return for the money.

There are cases reported in Edwards street and Greenwich avenue where the father spends his wages for liquor, leaving the children to take care of themselves. In the case in Greenwich avenue there are four girls in the family. Two are over sixteen years old and have been complained of for leading immoral lives.

Agent Preston said yesterday the girls under sixteen could be sent to the industrial school, but regarding the other girls he did not know what to do.

New Haven Orphan Asylum. The monthly meeting of the managers will be held at the asylum, 619 Elm street, on Thursday morning of this week at quarter after 10 o'clock.

THE MARIA P. DISASTER.

All of the Drowned Passengers Were Emigrants. Genoa, July 22.—Captain Ferrari, who commanded the sunken steamship Maria P., in which 148 Italians perished, has made a statement, in which he says he was asleep in his berth when the collision occurred. He was awakened by the terrific crash, followed by cries of distress, and rushed on deck.

When he reached the deck he found that the engines of the Ortiga had been reversed and that the Maria P. was sinking. He threw himself into the sea and kept himself afloat until he was picked up. An inquiry into the disaster has been opened here.

The bows of the Ortiga have in them a rent four yards long just above the water line. Admiral Morin, minister of marine, announced the disaster to the chamber of deputies this afternoon, and the news created a deep impression. Many of the deputies expressed sympathy with the families of the victims.

Later information is to the effect that all the passengers on the Maria P. were emigrants.

Spezia, July 22.—Additional details of the collision between the Italian steamship Ortiga and Maria P. and the sinking of the latter in the Gulf of Genoa include the testimony of the lookouts of both vessels that they sighted each other too late to avert the collision. Each also charges that the captain and mate of the other vessel were asleep in their bunks when they should have been on deck.

Senhor Balena, a Brazilian merchant, who was on his way home with his wife and three boys, one of them a babe in arms, is among the survivors. He says he and his family were asleep in their berths when they were awakened by the shock of the collision. He immediately ran to the deck with two of the children, while his wife carried the baby in her arms.

Reaching the deck they mounted the bridge, when they saw that the ship was sinking. He called to his wife to jump into the sea, which she did, and he followed her with the two boys. The two older boys were drowned, but Balena swam by the side of his wife and succeeded in holding her and the baby above water until they were all picked up.

Sperry was appointed by Judge Baldwin yesterday to act as a committee and hear the petition of the Consolidated road for a review of the order of the court of common council directing the railroad to replace the wooden bridge on Olive street with an iron one. Mr. Sperry will conduct the hearing on the facts in the case.

The case of Lester Carrier Frederick Goffe of Stamford, who distributes bills for the water, gas and electric light companies in that place in violation of the law, hearing on which was to have been held before United States Commissioner Wright yesterday, went over until August 5.

Patrolmen Clancy and Poronto raided James M. Lucey's saloon at 797 Grand avenue Sunday and found four men drinking in a room in the rear of the place. Lucey will be arrested.

Coroner Mix yesterday appointed Lieutenant Colonel Timothy E. Callahan deputy coroner for New Haven county to succeed Walter Pond, resigned.

The charge of embezzlement against H. Hilgenberg preferred by J. Kaiser, the Chapel street clothier, has been nolle prosequitur on the costs amounting to \$5.40. Papers were served yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Koon in a suit brought by Albert W. Cole of North Branford against Frederick W. Elliott of North Guilford to recover \$450 on a note. The suit is returnable to the next term of the common pleas court. Property on Goffe street belonging to Mrs. Jeanette M. Dayton of Dixwell avenue was attached yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Koon in a suit brought by T. W. Corbett.

CAMP AT PLAINVILLE. Improvements That Have Been Made—Excellent Preaching. Camp Ground, Plainville, July 21.—People accustomed to attend the Plainville camp meeting will be pleasantly surprised to find the improvements that have been made since the last annual camp meeting. The most notable are in the first circle, made by the erection of the following society houses: Meriden, Middletown, South Park, Hartford, Grace church, New Haven; Forestville and Higginum, saying nothing of the private cottages on the various avenues.

The corporation house has been greatly changed, the old part moved back and a new addition built in front. When completed it will afford lodgings for over fifty preachers. The canvases for the boarding tent and the preachers' stand are in place. S. H. Dutton is in charge of workmen, who are putting up tents and doing everything necessary in the preparation of the grounds.

The camp meeting services will be under the supervision of Rev. Grandall J. North, presiding elder of the New Haven district, who has already secured the services of many of the preachers in the district, ensuring an excellent preaching at the meeting. The singing will be conducted by Professor L. W. Harvey, of Hartford, who has had charge the last few years, assisted by a large chorus choir. The music has been full of inspiration and has greatly contributed to the enjoyment of the services. Correspondence should be directed to the "Plainville Camp Meeting," Plainville, Conn.

In Chairman Babcock's Hands.

The resignations of Lucius W. Bartlett and the Rev. S. B. Forbes, as secretary and the treasurer respectively of the Prohibition State committee, have been placed in the hands of the new chairman, Mr. L. A. Babcock of New Haven, taking effect whenever their successors can be designated. Mr. Babcock succeeded Chairman A. B. Lincoln some weeks ago. Messrs. Bartlett and Forbes resign for the reason that the chairman, secretary and treasurer constitute the executive committee and it is desirable that they should be bunched together locally, so as to secure prompt and effective action. On this account the secretary and treasurer will be chosen from New Haven or that vicinity.
