THE PRESIDING ELDER HERE

ARRESTED AT THE UNION STATION CHARGED WITH CONTEMPT.

Accompanied in a cab to Police Headquarters by Detective Cowles and Released on \$500—Allegations Made by the State.

Presiding Elder Crandall J. North of the New Haven district of the New York East Methodist Episcopal conference was arrested at the Union station yesterday afternoon by Detective Sergeant Cowles upon the arrival of the Shore Line express at 2:30 o'clock. The presiding elder came from Martha's Vineyard, where he is spending the summer, and Sergeant Cowles was at the station waiting for him.

The two went in a cab to police headquarters, where bail was fixed at \$500. Andrew Moorehead, proprietor of the Centennial American Hotel, at 363 State street, became his surety and he was released.

The warrant on which the presiding elder was arrested charges that at sundry times and dates between the first day of April and June 21, 1895, he uttered and caused to be published certain disparaging and derogatory statements concerning the administration of justice in the city court of New Haven by maliciously and spitefully criticizing and misrepresenting certain investigations pending in the city attorney's office, and with maligning and attacking Charles B. Matthews, who was the assistant city attorney of the city court prior to June 4, 1895, and who has since been the city attorney of the city court.

It charges that while Mr. Matthews was in the discharge of his duties the presiding elder, by the use of certain seditious and inflammatory articles, language and words, written and printed, so arranged and calculated as to prejudice the public mind as to a certain matter then and there pending in the city attorney's office, and then and there under investigation by the city attorney, to wit, the state vs. Rufus T. Cooper, did by said language, articles and words so published and caused to be published, endeavor to intimidate, hinder and impeach the city attorney in the discharge of his duties, and did cause him to act against his will and judgment by inciting and inflaming the public mind concerning the proceedings against Cooper.

It further alleges that the articles and language in question were written by the presiding elder and caused to be published by him over his own signature in all the public press of New Haven between the dates mentioned.

The warrant further states that on July 17, 1895, in the city of Meriden, the presiding elder did contemptuously and libelously use, speak, utter, publish and declare certain false, abusive, insolent and disrespectful language concerning Julius C. Cable, judge of the city court, and during a period when the case of the state against Cooper was pending in the city court and awaiting judgment thereon.

This allegation refers to the interview with Reporter John T. Maguire printed in the Meriden Journal and in other papers in the state served by the Connecticut Associated Press.

Ex-Judge Rufus S. Pickett of the presiding elder's counsel had a copy of the warrant made, and with Attorney Charles Kleiner, who is also Mr. North's counsel, and the presiding elder was in consultation last night.

The presiding elder when seen said the newspapers had abused him and he declined to be interviewed. His counsel also refused to talk.

Lewis Allen, editor of the Journal, and Reporter Maguire will be in the city court this morning to testify in the case.

It is not thought that Sidney W. Kent of Meriden, who heard the interview between Maguire and the presiding elder, will be able to be here to-day, though it is possible he may reach here from Amherst, Mass., where he is on business. He is a witness for the defense.

A CURIOUS PROBLEM.

Fewer People Die in Dull Times Than in Times of Prosperity.

Did you ever think seriously that the undertaking business was affected by dull times? asks the Danbury News. Yet it is a fact that the undertakers, or funeral directors as they term themselves now-a-days, have as much reason to complain of hard times as those engaged in any other kind of business. Many more or less satisfactory reasons are given for it.

It may seem strange that fewer people die during a period of financial depression than when prosperity reigns, yet statistics prove that in Danbury the death rate in 1894 was over a hundred less than in 1893, and that in 1893 the percentage of deaths was lower than in 1892, when this town did not feel so keenly the financial stringency that has since become so general.

A well known funeral director, when asked to explain why so few people die during a dull season, said: "You have asked me too much. It is enough for me that it is true. Of course, every person can venture a guess, but for me to tell just why people do not die in dull times is an impossibility. I have tried many times to solve the problem, but have given it up each time. You will have to ask some one else."
