1,308 DEATHS IN JULY. Some Facts and Figures From State Health Board's Report. The mortality report for July has been received from 157 towns in the state by the state board of health. There were 1,308 deaths reported in the state during the month. This was 355 more than in June, and 63 less than the average number of deaths in July for the five years preceding the present. The death rate was 20.7 for the large towns, for the small towns 15.9, and 19.3 for the whole state. The deaths from zymotic diseases were 426, being 32.5 per cent of the total mortality. The following towns are reported as having no deaths in July: Avon, Bethany, Bethlehem, Bloomfield, Bolton, Bozrah, Bridgewater, Canterbury, Clinton, Columbia, Durham, Eastford, East Granby, East Haven, Ellington, Hampton, Harwinton, Lebanon, Lisbon, Lyme, Marlborough, Middlebury, Newington, Plymouth, Prospect, Roxbury, Salem, Sherman, Union, Warren, Willington—31. No report was received from Groton.

Damage Was Trivial. Washington, Aug. 16.—The report of the board appointed to examine the cruiser Columbia, in dry dock at New York, to ascertain the extent of the injuries received by her while in dry dock at Southampton, England, has been received by Acting Secretary McAdoo. After reading it over he telegraphed orders to the commandant of the Brooklyn navy yard to have the necessary repairs made at once. The report shows that the damage sustained by the vessel was trivial.

Beautiful Floral Pieces. The funeral of Mrs. Louise Kelley Gallagher, formerly a leading singer in St. Patrick's church, took place yesterday, with mass at St. Patrick's church at 9 o'clock. Rev. The interment was in the St. Bernard's cemetery.

NEW HAVEN AT SARATOGA. James English's Carriage Often Seen—Convention Talk—Medicinal Virtues of the Springs—Commodious Hotels—"The Defender," a New Drink—Gambling Now Suppressed. Saratoga Springs, Aug. 15.—The usual number of Saratoga veterans seem to be here this season, and a large addition of new faces is also observed on the promenades every day. Many are coming here from the mountains and sea side resorts on their way to the places of their nativity. There has been quite a scarcity of the sporting fraternity here on account of the rigid laws against gambling, which have been quite strictly enforced this summer. The races began July 29, and Edward Kearney, president of the Saratoga Racing association contemplated continuing the races for forty days, but the slim attendance has caused him to conclude the turf meeting August 23, as the gate receipts have been at a loss of over \$500 a day. The club house and other gambling resorts are also devoid of faro, roulette, and other gambling implements, and have been as quiet all the season as a cat watching a mouse. But there is great activity in numerous other amusements. The weekly hops at the Clarendon and other hotels are more largely attended than ever before. The soul inspiring music by celebrated orchestras in the parks and on the piazzas and in the parlors of the various hotels are daily enjoyed by the numerous guests.
