"A NEW ORDER OF THINGS."

A BRILLIANT DISCUSSION AT TRINITY M. E. CHURCH.

By Rev. Dr. Harcourt of Baltimore, Pastor of the Largest M. E. Church in That Pleasant City.

Rev. Dr. Harcourt of Grace M. E. Church, Baltimore, preached in Trinity M. E. church yesterday morning and evening.

Dr. Harcourt is pastor of the largest Methodist church in Baltimore and a gifted speaker, and well met the high anticipations entertained; and a large congregation was present to hear him.

THE SUBJECT OF HIS MORNING SERMON WAS: "A NEW ORDER OF THINGS." The text was taken from John 12th chapter, 44th verse.

"A new commandment I give unto you that ye love one another." The doctor said in part: There was no lack of theology in the world when Christ came.

THE JEW HAD NO DEALINGS WITH SAMARITANS. They considered themselves made of better stuff—more highly favored by heaven—a chosen people.

THE HEBREW LOOKED UPON THIS CODE OF MORALS AS PARTICULARLY THEIR OWN, AND NEVER MEANT FOR THE VULGAR HERD OF MANKIND.

THEY TOOK IT FOR GRANTED THAT HIS PROMISE MEANT THEM AND THEIR CHILDREN FOREVER—and they had not a little authority for believing this.

"A NEW ORDER OF THINGS WAS A NECESSITY. A new interpretation of the Scriptures. A new exposition of the decalogue. In a word, a new law; a new commandment! Hence Jesus came, and came with a message for the sons of men."

"A NEW COMMANDMENT I GIVE UNTO YOU." Strange words these—what right had this man to make a new commandment? Was not the old law good enough? Could He improve upon what Moses had given? When obtained He this authority? The band of men who gathered around Jesus had just as little prestige and just as little influence upon society as the Coxeyites of to-day.

YET WITH ALL AUTHORITY JESUS PREACHES A NEW LAW AND A NEW LIFE. He claims the law of Moses could not promise. John gives this thought a beautiful setting. He says: "The law was given by Moses but grace (power) and truth came by Jesus Christ. The law is a fence to keep in or out. Its a prohibition; a proclamation. It does not give a man power to do or not to do. It leaves him helpless after he hears it as before his knowledge came to him. Now grace and knowledge supply both knowledge and ability to do. The bestowment of power to do the right thing is greater than the proclamation of the right thing to be done. Hence Jesus is greater than Moses, as doing is greater than saying."

"THIS IS THE CHURCH'S GREATEST NEED TO-DAY—a quickening, a resurrection from the dead and defunct theories to active life service in this world. Theory is a body, practice is the two and you have a living being. Religion, if anything, is practical."

"A THEORY WHICH IS TOO HIGH FOR PRACTICE IS OF NO earthly good. If not practical, religion is good for nothing. Oh! ye saints of a goodness to be done somewhere else, of a heaven to be in the sweet by-and-by."

"DON'T YOU THINK IT IS TIME FOR CHRISTIAN COMMON SENSE TO THINK OF A HEAVEN HERE AS WELL AS A HEAVEN THERE, AND THAT THE HEAVEN IS AS IMPORTANT AS THE HEAVEN NOW IS? I think so, and that there is every material in the heaven of which to make a heaven? That the wisdom and love which would make you so sweet in the sunny land would make you equally wholesome here? And the place most needing angels is here, and here is to-day and there is to-morrow; and that to-morrow never comes and of its nature never can. Grace and truth have come and they are not for the rest of this life, but for the rest of the ages."

"THE REIGN OF TRUTH WOULD MAKE A HEAVEN ANYWHERE; and what is the use of dying to get to heaven if we can get it by living it? There is no other time but now. Truth is life, and we cannot get the truth by lying or by dying. The grave is not the gate to immortality. We have got to go the other way."

"WHAT, THEN, IS THIS NEW COMMANDMENT? Not an old law covered over by the dust of the ages and brought out into the light, but a new commandment, a new law for a new age; a new ordinance for a new order of things. Love one another. This is the law, the new law, the law of the new kingdom—the law by which earth becomes an Eden. Jesus Christ was the most progressive man of His age. He was weary of the solemn mockery of the priests, weary of the mumbling, self-praising, weary of their worship of scrolls, parchments and sacred books. Hence the frequency of the word 'new' upon His lips. They said His doctrine was 'new.' He told them it was folly to put 'new' wine in old bottles and 'new' cloth on old garments. The old commandments were from without, and written on tablets of stone; the new commandments from within, and written on the fleshy table of the heart. The old commandments alarm and terrify. The new captivate and impress, and the last is better than the first, because it contains much that was lacking in the former and contains all that was in the old and more, for love is the fulfilling of the law."
