TO REORGANIZE ERIE R. R. THE PLAN TO REHABILITATE THE SYSTEM MADE PUBLIC. Lines to be Consolidated—Common Stock Assessed \$12 a Share, Prior at \$5. New York, Aug. 26.—J. P. Morgan & Co. of this city and J. S. Morgan & Co. of London this morning issued simultaneously to the public here and in England the plan for the reorganization of the Erie railway system. It is contained in a pamphlet of thirty-three pages. Accompanying it is an explanatory circular.

The reorganization committee consists of Messrs. C. H. Coster, Louis Fitzgerald and Anthony J. Thomas. The plan states that "the Erie system is made up of the lines known as the New York, Lake Erie and Western, the New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio, and Chicago and Erie railroads. These two latter are operated by or for the Erie, upon its guaranty that a fixed proportion of their gross earnings shall be paid as net earnings without regard to the actual results of the business. This arrangement is inherently weak, and develops a conflict of interests between three companies which ought to be close allies; and it also checks development and improvement."

"The permanent removal of these troubles is most desirable. In order to remove them, and to establish the community of interests above referred to, the plan proposes to consolidate, or otherwise unite, as therein set out, the three properties in one new corporation. "An arrangement has been made with the New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio railroad voting trustees whereby, subject to ratification by their beneficiaries, they undertake to foreclose and deliver the New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio property, subject only to the prior lien, equipment and leased line securities, for which reservation is made."

It is understood that Messrs. J. P. Morgan & Co. have also practically secured the Chicago and Erie, so that the Erie system, which is now a weak and disjointed affair, will be solidified into one compact organization from New York to Chicago, very much in the way that the same parties have united the former so-called Richmond Terminal system in the present Southern railway. No one has ever supposed heretofore that this was possible in the case of the Erie lines, but it now seems to be entirely practicable.

New securities are to be created on the entire line from New York to Chicago, with all branches, coal roads, etc., as follows: (1) \$175,000,000 first consolidated mortgage 100-year gold bonds, secured by mortgage and pledge of all property acquired under the plan of reorganization by the new company. Of these bonds \$35,000,000 will be 4 per cent. prior lien bonds and \$140,000,000 will be 3 to 4 per cent. general lien bonds; (2) \$30,000,000 first preferred 4 per cent. non-cumulative stock; (3) \$15,000,000 second preferred 4 per cent. non-cumulative stock; (4) \$100,000,000 common stock.

The mileage of the new company will be: Miles. New York, Lake Erie and Western proper..... 538 New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio..... 600 Chicago and Erie..... 250 New York, Lake Erie and Western Auxiliary companies..... 650 1,388 with valuable terminal facilities at Jersey City, Weehawken, Buffalo, etc., and also one-fifth ownership in the stock of the Chicago and Western Indiana Railroad company.

"Of the prior lien bonds, \$5,000,000 are reserved for enlargement and improvement of terminal facilities, including extension of tracks, additional wharf facilities at New York, reducing grades, constructing double track and purchasing additional equipment, to be used only with the consent of the voting trustees.

"Of the general lien bonds, \$92,658,000 are reserved for the ultimate acquisition of all bonds and guaranteed stocks now left undisturbed on various parts of the system, and \$17,000,000 for new construction, betterments, additions, etc., after 1897, not over \$1,000,000 to be used in any one year.

The reorganization converts into new securities everything on the Erie subsequent to the first consols, everything on the N. Y., P. and O. except \$8,000,000 4 1/2 per cent. bonds, and everything on the Chicago and Erie subsequent to the first mortgage.

The present Erie second consols get 75 per cent. in the new general lien bonds and 65 per cent. in new first preferred stock; the funded coupon bonds of 1885 get 100 per cent. in new general lien bonds, 10 per cent. in new first preferred stock and 10 per cent. in new second preferred stock; Erie incomes get 40 per cent. in new general lien bonds, and 60 per cent. in new first preferred stock; the present preferred stock, on paying assessment, gets 100 per cent. in new preferred, and the present common stock, on paying assessment, gets 100 per cent. in new common stock. Nothing additional is given for the assessment in either case. Chicago and Erie incomes get 100 per cent. in new second preferred stock.

time will subject the stock to a 50 per cent. larger assessment; viz, \$18 per share on common and \$12 per share on preferred. A syndicate of \$25,000,000 in money has been formed to subscribe for \$16,000,000 of the prior lien bonds of the new company, and to take the place and succeed to all the rights of holders of preferred and common stock of the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad company, who shall not deposit their stock and pay the assessments thereon. J. P. Morgan & Co. and J. S. Morgan & Co. charge \$500,000 for their services, and take common stock in payment. It is understood that the plan has been accepted by all the large interests both here and abroad, and that it will be pushed rapidly to a conclusion. The plan is replete with tables and statistics justifying the various steps which it proposes and the various conclusions which it presents.

NEW HAVEN'S LOSSES. The Deaths of Eli Whitney and ex-Governor Morris. From very many of our active and prominent citizens the remark has fallen that New Haven has lost two of her best, most useful and most prominent men in the deaths of Eli Whitney and ex-Governor Morris. Both were men of great usefulness, of unblemished name, honored and worthy of honor.

At the Dwight Place church Sunday morning Dr. Twitchell made a very earnest and pleasing reference to the recent providences that have come to New Haven in the death of prominent men. He spoke very kindly and warmly of Mr. Eli Whitney, in whose death the city has suffered a great loss, and somewhat more at length of ex-Governor Morris, whom it was his privilege to know personally, having spent two seasons in camp with him. Dr. Twitchell spoke particularly of the strong manhood and sterling worth of ex-Governor Morris, both as a city official and as a business man of large interests. He referred also to deaths in Dwight Place families and made announcements regarding the funerals, respectively, of Mr. George K. Whiting and of Mrs. Hotchkiss, at both of which he was called upon to officiate in the afternoon.

FOREST FIRES IN JERSEY. It is believed that the Damage Done in Two Days Will Foot Up to \$80,000. Egg Harbor City, N. J., Aug. 26.—The forest fires are still raging furiously southwest of this place, but no buildings were destroyed during the night. There are several houses in the course of the flames, and hundreds of men and boys are fighting to prevent the flames from burning them up. The farmers

and many of the residents did not sleep last night, but worked hard to save their own and their neighbors' property. It is estimated that the loss by the forest fires yesterday and to-day will foot up to \$30,000.
