A NEW HALL.

The property on Court street occupied by the Jewish synagogue will have a much different look in a few months. Mr. John E. There is a frontage of seventy-seven feet, all of which he will use. On the ground floor will be four stores. Between the two middle ones will be a Venetian arcade leading to the dance hall in the rear. This will be the largest hall in the city, the Second regiment armory excepted. It will go to the extreme length of the land, which reaches back 150 feet.

The entire second floor will be made into lodge and club rooms, and all will be elegantly finished.


