

Entertainments.
HYPERION.
The first performance of "Leonardo,"
the new opera by T. Pearsall Thorne
and Gilbert, was given last night. It
is only the third performance of the
present company, who are preparing
for a New York engagement at the Gar-
rick. For nearly all the principal mem-
bers of the cast this is their first year
in opera, although several are well
known in concert work. For this rea-
son there was an amateurish atmos-
phere about last night's performance
that will probably disappear with time.
Mr. Burgess has written some bright
lyrics in the much-copied Gilbertian
manner, but his plot is weak and lack-
ing in humor. The story is pretty and
picturesque, and it is judiciously cut
in some scenes and brightened in others.
It will give more variety to the action
and bring it within proper limits as to
time. Mr. Thorne's music is bright and
pretty, but lacking in depth. Some num-
bers, notably the love-duet and finale
in the second act and Beatrice's solo in
the third, show a decided advance on
"The Maid of Plymouth." Mr. Thorne
has a distinct gift of graceful and plea-
sing melody, but his musical knowledge
of orchestration and handling of themes
is not adequate.

The best singer of the cast was Mar-
guerite Lemore. She has a good sopra-
no voice and sings and acts with spirit.
George Devoll, who is quite popular in
this city, made a pleasing appearance as
the hero and sang with nice discretion.
Grant Odell is well known here, too,
but he has much to learn about the
stage. Virginia Earl did very clever
comedy work and earned well-merited
applause. Lucille Saunders has a part
well suited to her and she acted and
sang it in a very creditably artistic
manner. Hobart Smock and J. H. Ry-
ley were good in small parts. The
chorus was pretty poor. The costumes
were elaborate and costly, but rather
too gaudy for good ensemble effect.
The musical conductor was Signor Mar-
reale. There will probably be a large
audience to-night, for Mr. Thorne has
so many friends in town and so many
of the cast are well known here. Among
those present last evening were Mrs.
Charles Mitchell, Mr. and Mrs. Ned
Mitchell, Professor Bristol of New
York, Erlanson Bushnell, Professor
Sam Sanford, Mr. and Mrs. H. Grant
Thompson and Miss Ingersoll.

Saturday matinee. The dresses which

be historically correct. The lesson they
convey is that in the feminine dress of

copied by the modish autocrats.



PREST INDICTED FOR ARSON.
Grand Jury brings in a Bill Against Father
Fitzgerald.
Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 15.—The grand
jury to-day presented an indictment
against Rev. J. M. Fitzgerald, pastor
of Holy Cross church at Charlotte,
charging him with arson in the second
degree in setting fire to an unoccupied
building in Charlotte on the night of
May 23, 1893, thereby endangering the
lives of Theodore Barlow, George Bar-
low and Marlow.
The building to which it is charged
that Fitzgerald applied the torch was
the property of himself, the Barlows
being in danger by the building set on
fire, which was next door to the one in
which they were sleeping. It is almost
certain that more indictments will be
presented against Fitzgerald. It was
suggested that he would be indicted for
conspiracy in connection with the burn-
ing of the parochial building a few
months ago.
John and Nora Cronin have been in-
dicted for setting fire to the school. Jus-
tice Davy has fixed bail at \$10,000 each.
Father Fitzgerald's lawyer said that he
would want bail for his client also, and
Justice Davy fixed the amount in his
case at \$10,000.
