

POLI'S WONDERLAND THEATER.

LUTHER AND THE REFORMATION.

Interesting Services held Yesterday at the Swedish Lutheran Church—the 328th Anniversary of the Reformation Appropriately Commemorated.
At the Swedish Lutheran church on St. John street last evening Rev. A. J. Emstom gave a very interesting address, taking as his subject: "Some causes that Luther, to publish his celebrated thesis against Indulgences, and the immediate effects." He spoke in part as follows:
The fifteenth century belongs to those remarkable epochs in which all the efforts of the mind indicate one determined and general character, and one unchanging striving towards the same goal. A revival of learning had been kindled throughout Europe. The western world awakened from the slumber of ages and one of the mightiest intellectual revolutions ever known occurred just in time to become one of the potent factors in securing the triumph of the reformation.
The intellectual awakening gave a powerful stimulus to literary culture. The conquests of the church were often so rapid and so vast that her capacity of assimilation was overtaxed. Like America opening her arms to receive

and civilize the world the church found herself the mistress of immense masses of people who lacked adequate resources for their instruction and transformation.

The Reformation was the work of God, a work not of a day or a year, but stretching its roots far back into preceding centuries and reaching its crisis at the signal of Luther's hammer. When the clock strikes the man for the hour appears upon the stage. C. E. Seshore, who just returned from Sweden and Germany, also gave a talk in the evening on "Reminiscences from places connected with the life of Luther." Mr. Seshore made a study of this subject, and among other places that he visited was Wittenberg, where Luther is buried and where he spent most of his life.

LUTHER LEAGUE OF THE STATE.

The Luther League of Connecticut will meet at the Swedish Lutheran church in this city next Friday evening. Quite a number of the young people from Meriden will attend. Rev. Mr. Haas of New York delivers the English address and Rev. C. R. Tappert of Meriden the German address. There will also be an address in the Swedish language by Rev. Mr. Oman of New Britain. There will be singing by the church choir of Trinity church on George street, and music by the orchestra of the latter church. Solists and a quartet will sing.
