

NORTH HAVEN.

Dec. 24.—The North Haven celebration of Forefather's Day already referred to in the "Courier" was very successfully carried out, and honor is due the people who so nobly contributed of their time and means and displayed their choicest treasures in commemoration of the great event.

There was a sad ending to the joyous occasion. As the audience rose to unite in singing America a cry of fire was heard and nearly all the men rushed to the house of Clarence Frost to assist in removing furniture from the burning building. They succeeded in saving some of it, but much that was valuable was lost. The house was entirely destroyed.

On the evening of January 1, 1896, in Memorial hall, an old-fashioned supper will be served to all members of the Congregational church and friends. A musical entertainment will be provided. The hall will be open after 6 o'clock a. m. to receive contributions of food, which are hereby solicited. A great time is expected.

An entertainment for the members of the primary department of the Congregational Sunday school will be given in Sunday school room on Tuesday, December 27.

The annual meeting of the First Church of Christ will be held in the lecture room of the meeting house on Thursday, January 2, 1896. The meeting will be opened with the delivery of the preparatory lecture, followed by the election of officers and other business.

A Lafayette plate, one of the few now in existence, was allowed to grace this table. The chairs were also very old. R. W. Smith and Mrs. Smith were at this table and furnished two well cooked turkeys for the feast. Mr. and Mrs. L. V. Tuttle and Mr. and Mrs. Marcus Marks were also seated around Mr. Eaton's table.

The next table was in charge of Mr. Whitney Elliott and daughter, Miss Mary Elliott. Old Lafayette plates and spoons hammered out of coins many years since, and a choice pewter platter, were interesting relics furnished by Mr. Elliott. Selectman Linsley and Mrs. Linsley were at Mr. Elliott's table.

Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Linsley were among those seated at this table. Choice old ware was shown by Mrs. Linsley, and Mr. Linsley exhibited a brass candlestick arranged to occupy a small space and carried by him through the war. As a whole this table contained many relics and curiosities.

On Rev. Mr. Lusk's and Mrs. Lusk's table were old spoons belonging to Mrs. Lusk's grandmother, a large, handsome banquet lamp and other choice pieces. The next table was Dr. R. B. Good-year's, with pink decorations and valuable pieces of china.

Mr. and Mrs. C. N. Turner used at their table Mrs. Andrew Austin's old china. Lovely carnations decorated this table. Rev. Mr. Simons was not able to be present, but Mrs. Simons did the honors of the table. The china was old and a spray of holly lay at each plate.
