ADVICERS FROM SAN FRANCISCO GIVE INFORMATION OF THE PURCHASE BY THE NIAGARA CANAL COMPANY OF THE PLANT OF THE AMERICAN CONTRACTOR DREDGING COMPANY at Colon, formerly used on the works of the Panama canal. The entire plant, it is claimed, is rapidly being put in order for removal to San Juan del Norte (Greytown), and some dredges and tugs are already on their way there. This is the plant that did the greater part of the effective work accomplished upon the Panama canal. The dredges are of exceptional power and capacity. These powerful dredges are to be used in harbor dredging and in excavating the first ten miles of the canal from the mouth to the first lock, and if properly worked by the company rapid progress will now be made.

IN THE GAZETTE OF AUGUST 12 WAS A LONG editorial making an attack upon Colonel Masten. This whole attack against the gentleman seems to be simply the result of personal animosity. GERMAN CATHOLICS. Cardinal Gibbons Gives Them Some Good Advice at Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, August 19.—Cardinal Gibbons talked today before the German Catholic Verein. He referred to the German citizens as the most thrifty, conservative and most prosperous of our people. It was his hope that members of the Verein would thoroughly identify themselves with the spirit of the country in which they lived. That they would take active personal interest in public affairs. That while not advising them to become politicians in the unfavorable sense of that term or that they should even be too ambitious for political offices they should labor in common with their fellow citizens in using their best efforts in the election to office of the most upright and eligible candidates.

"Like Ruth who left her native soil and followed her adopted mother into the land of promise," said the Cardinal, "you have followed your friends across the Atlantic saying with Ruth, 'your country shall be my country and your God my God,' and as Ruth became the mother of a race of Kings so you and your children destined to be the rulers of a great nation. Not perhaps by holding the reins of government but in your capacity as sovereign citizens."

IN THE CONVENTION Henry J. Spanghorst, the President, delivered the annual address. He commented severely upon the Bennett school law recently passed in Wisconsin.

A SAILOR'S YARN. Story of a Terrible Storm at Valparaiso in July.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 19.—The Call prints the following: A sailor who shipped on the American bark Portland Lloyds at Valparaiso, Chili, has written to his mother in this city giving an account of a terrible storm in Valparaiso Bay. Following are extracts from the letter:

"July 3, blowing a gale and the waves are breaking over the city. Shipping is in great danger."

"July 2. The Nova Scotia ship, an English bark and a steambark went down last night. The bark went ashore near the consulate and the Nova Scotia is on the rocks fast going to pieces."

The letter was evidently sent on board the mail steamer bound north before the storm abated. Since then no advices have been received as to whether the Portland Lloyds and other vessels weathered the gale or not.

APPROVING, WITH AMENDMENTS, THE FUNDING ACT OF ARIZONA. Be enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the act of the revised statutes of Arizona of 1887, known as "The XXXI-Funding," be and is hereby amended to read as follows: That all moneys heretofore and hereafter approved and confirmed, to be used for the purpose of funding the XXXI-Funding and loan, Chapter one, Territorial, county, municipal and school district indebtedness.

"PAR. 202. (Sec. 1.) For the purpose of liquidating and providing for the payment of the outstanding and existing indebtedness of the Territory of Arizona and such indebtedness as may be or is now authorized by law, the Governor of said Territory, together with the Territorial Auditor and Territorial Secretary, and their successors in office, shall constitute a board of commissioners, to be called the Board of Commissioners of the Territory of Arizona, and shall have and exercise the powers and perform the duties hereinafter provided, to wit: "PAR. 203. (Sec. 2.) It shall be, and is hereby, declared the duty of the loan commissioners to provide for the redemption of the principal and interest of all outstanding indebtedness, and to become due, or that is now, or may be hereafter, authorized by law, and to be hereafter, authorized by law, or that is now, or may be hereafter, authorized by law, which may at any time become due, or is now, or may be hereafter, authorized by law, the said loan commissioners, or any one of them, may, at their discretion, issue and deliver negotiable coupon bonds of the Territory when the same can be done at a lower rate of interest than the principal and interest of the said indebtedness, or at such rate as may be practicable in determination of one of the following: (a) That the rate of interest, not less than two hundred and fifty dollars, may be issued when necessary. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate to be fixed by said loan commissioners, but in no case to exceed five per centum per annum, which interest shall be paid in gold coin or its equivalent in lawful money of the United States, on the fifteenth day of January in each year, at the office of the Territorial Treasurer, or at such bank in the city of New York, in the state of New York, or in the city of San Francisco, in the state of California, or such place as may be designated by said loan commissioners, at the option of the purchaser of said bonds, the place of payment being mentioned in said bonds. The principal of said bonds shall be made payable in the full amount of the money due, fifty years after the date of their issue. Said Treasurer reserves the right to redeem at any time after twenty years after the date thereof.

"That all acts or parts of acts in conflict with this act are hereby repealed. APPROVED, June 25, 1890. PROCLAMATION OF REWARD. To whom it may concern: WHEREAS, It has come to my knowledge that Ed. Baker, eldest son of J. H. Baker, who resides at Lookout, on the Sierra Ancha mountains, about forty miles north of Globe, Gila county, was murdered in a most brutal manner by some person or persons unknown, (though the presence of Indian tracks in the immediate vicinity strongly indicate that the crime was committed by Indians). Now, therefore, I, Louis Wolfley, Governor of the Territory of Arizona, by virtue of the power within me vested do hereby offer a reward in the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars to be paid out of the treasury of the Territory for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who committed the aforementioned crime. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the Territory to be affixed. Done at Phoenix, the capital, this 20th day of July, A. D. 1890. LEWIS WOLFLEY, Governor.
