CONVENTION NOTES. County Surveyor Hicks is a delegate from Yuma county. "Bill" Freese, an old-time Phoenician, is a delegate from Prescott.

The Cochise county men are late, but they will form an important part of the Convention when they do come.

Brewster Cameron, clerk of the First Judicial District Court, is in attendance as a delegate from Pima county.

The Tucson delegation is quartered at the Mills House; the Yavapai contingent will be found at the Commercial.

J. M. W. Moore, one of Prescott's delegates, was a member of the last Legislative Council from Yavapai county.

Charles Holborn, a merchant of Florence and an old-time Arizona Republican is a delegate from Pinal County.

George E. Brown, a member of the Assembly in the Twelfth Arizona Legislature, is one of the Yavapai delegation.

W. H. Hardy, from Mohave county and Will Boshford, of Yavapai, will be in on today's train by way of California.

George R. Morse, manager of the Blinn Lumber Company's business at Casa Grande, is a member of the Pinal County delegation.

The delegates from Pima and Yuma counties to the Republican Territorial Convention arrived by yesterday's train from the south.

David Henderson, the well-known Tucson banker, is too strong a Republican to miss the Convention. As usual, he is boiling over with party enthusiasm.

C. W. Wright is one of the Pima county delegation. He is the nominee of his party for the office of District Attorney and is, from all accounts, a sure winner.

Wm. O. O'Neill, Sheriff of Yavapai county and Adjutant General of the Territory, is in the city attending the convention. He states that he is not in the fight for Delegate.

W. L. Van Horn, an attorney of Flagstaff, alternate to the World's Fair with Commissioner Coats, will attend the Convention as delegate from Yavapai county.

The convention will meet at Patton's Opera House this morning at 10:30 and will presumably be called to order by Secretary Morford in the absence of Chairman Christy.

Frank M. Murphy, Superintendent of the Congress mine, was notified Sunday morning by a messenger from Prescott that the convention would convene on Tuesday and started at once, arriving here last evening.

Nogales is represented in the Pima County delegation by Charles Altschul. He is no stranger to Phoenix, having been during 1878 and 1879, a member of the firm of Goldman & Co., and afterward assignee of M. Peralta & Co.

Harry Carpenter, perhaps the best known man in the Territory of Arizona, came in from Yuma yesterday to attend the Convention as a delegate from Cochise County. He is now the Secretary of the Territorial Insane Asylum.

The Yavapai contingent came in last evening from Prescott driven down by Hathaway in a lively rig. They are as follows: W. O. O'Neill, George E. Brown, W. A. Freese and J. M. W. Moore, of Prescott, and W. L. Van Horn, of Flagstaff.

Among the delegates to the Republican Convention who were callers at the Republican office yesterday, were Capt. F. S. Ingalls and L. A. Hicks, of Yuma; Hon. David Henderson, Hon. Brewster Cameron, Judge C. W. Wright and W. S. Sturgis, of Tucson; J. H. Carpenter, of Tombstone; J. W. Wentworth, of Gila county; W. L. Van Horn, of Flagstaff, and others.

The Tombstone delegation was on the regular train. It was somewhat delayed by an accident near Pantano and reached Red Rock to find about half a mile of track impassable. The train was backed to Tucson, a distance of about thirty

miles, and a wrecking train sent out. It was expected that the track would be propped up early last evening, when the regular passenger would essay its passage westward.

A special was dispatched to the Maricopa and Phoenix at 3:30 in the afternoon, with instructions to await the arrival of the eastern train until 1:30 this morning. From all accounts, however, there will be no train until late this morning, in which case the delegates will not be here until 1:30 p. m. today.

The Tucson men came to Maricopa in the caboose attached to an engine bound for Yuma, taking an idea that it would be unsafe to wait for the coming of the regular train. The apprehension was well founded for just after their little train passed Red Rock the track washed out behind them.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

An Important Session of the County Fathers Held Yesterday.

At their meeting yesterday the Board of Supervisors set the tax levy for this year at the following, on each \$100 of assessed valuation:

Includes General Fund, School Bonds, Road Fund, Interest on Maricopa and Phoenix Railroad Bonds, Interest on Court House Bonds, Interest on Funding Bonds, Interest on Road Fund Redemption Bonds, Interest on Hospital Bonds, Interest on Insane Asylum Land Bonds, Interest on Black Canyon Road Bonds, Interest on Cave Creek Road Bonds.

Total \$17.50. To this levy must be added about 80 cents per \$100, which will likely be the tax levy for Territorial purposes, making in all \$2.50.

This will mean a collection of over \$112,500, of which amount the Territory would take \$36,000. The expense of running the county has been much increased during the last year.

The Clerk was directed to transmit to the Secretary of the Funding Commission a statement of the indebtedness of the county, both floating and bonded, and to demand from said Commission a sufficient number of bonds to take up the floating debt of the county.

A new school district was established to be known as Camp Creek District No. 38. Its boundaries were set as follows: Commencing at the northeast corner of School District No. 38, east along the county line to the Verde river, south to Camp Creek, west to the east line of District No. 38, north to place of beginning. The Board adjourned to 10 a. m. today.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

Three cars of general freight arrived by yesterday's train.

A social dance will take place at Patton's Park this evening under the management of J. Politzer. Only eighty invitations have been issued, and a pleasant time is anticipated.

Mr. Hooyer, whose residence was on the Yuma road, near J. C. Rankin's, died yesterday morning at 4 o'clock from a complication of disorders. He was 73 years of age, and leaves a large family of young children.

Word reached Phoenix yesterday of a shocking accident in the morning on the Southern Pacific, near Pantano, about twenty miles east of Tucson. The information is very meager, but from it is gleaned that a collision occurred between a work train and west bound express No. 20. Seven persons were injured.

Two laborers had both legs broken, and one of them was so seriously hurt that his life is deemed in danger.

A meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Smith, Burger and Dorris present. A franchise of fifty years duration was granted to Jerry Millay to establish in this city a telephone line. Three telephones were ordered for the use of the city at an expense of \$20 each for setting up, and a rental of \$5 each per month. Some discussion was had as to the advisability of a numbering ordinance, but nothing definite was done.
