THE BASEBALL GAMES.

Arrangements Perfected for the Contests During Fair Week. At a meeting of the Phoenix Baseball Club, yesterday, James F. Murphy was elected Manager; D. Goldberg, Secretary; A. P. Walbridge, Treasurer, and A. Thoman, Captain. Messrs. Kibbey, Goldberg and Murphy were appointed a Reception Committee. The batteries selected for the first game are Goldberg and Walbridge; second game, William Widmer and Lee Grey; third game, Goldberg and Walbridge. The people of the city subscribe \$223 for the games; of this, \$110 will be sent to the Tucson team to defray their expenses to Phoenix. The first game of the series will be called at 10 a. m., Friday; second game, Saturday at 3 p. m., and the third game on Sunday at 3 p. m. The games are so arranged that they will not interfere with the Fair program. The contests will be upon the grounds at Patton's Park.

Mohave County. From the Mohave Miner. The machinery in the O K mill, Gold Basin, is in position and a run on the ore from the mine will be made this week. This is said to be the best and most complete mill in Arizona. Hon. George W. Cheyney, the Republican candidate for Delegate to Congress, and Hon. J. M. W. Moore, candidate for Joint Congressman of the Northern District, were in town Friday, making the acquaintance of the voters of this vicinity. They are pleasant, genial gentlemen and made a good many friends here. On Sunday afternoon as one of Beebe's big teams was watering at Beecher's corral they were stampeded by Indian dogs barking at them. They rushed pell mell through the streets and out of town, going east, and through the railroad cut, where the most valuable animal was caught by the west bound passenger train and killed. The horse was valued at \$150. The Atlantic and Pacific Railroad are putting on Mexicans from El Paso, Tex., as section hands on the desert sections. They will take the place of Mohave Indians, who have a way of working when it suits them. The Mexicans came on a three months' contract, to be returned, transportation free, if they do not like the job. The greater portion will return at that time, as they do not like this country.

IN CENTRAL AMERICA.

False Assurances of Safety Lead a Revolutionist into Danger. SAN FRANCISCO, October 12.-By the steamer San Juan news comes that the warring Central Americans are in a very unsettled condition. General Moran, a refugee, who left this city by the Colima on her last trip, is a prisoner at the capital at Guatemala, if he has not been shot as a revolutionist. He was booked for San Salvador, but at San José de Guatemala telegraphed to General Ezeta to know if it would be safe for him to visit the capital of Guatemala. The answer was in the affirmative, but no sooner did he leave the steamer than he was arrested and thrown into prison. Information given the San Juan on her trip up was that he stood a very poor chance of escaping from being shot as a revolutionist.

THE NICARAGUA CANAL.

Encouraging Reports Received From the Great American Enterprise. CHICAGO, October 12.-The News' Washington special says: Official information recently received here furnishes ground for confidence that the Nicaragua canal will be completed within the next six or seven years. There are now more than 1000 men at work on the line and six surveying parties are in the field under the direction of Chief Engineer Menocal, making details and estimates upon which to base contracts with private corporations for the necessary dam locks and excavations.

SOCIALIST WORKMEN.

Representatives From Hundreds of Associations Meet in Lille. LILLE, October 12.-The Socialist Workmen's Congress, at which were represented 212 associations, composed mostly of the followers of Marx, opened here today. Among the delegates were representatives of the English eight hour league. The congress adopted resolutions congratulating German socialists upon the expiration of the anti-socialist law; declaring in favor of an international demonstration by workmen next May Day, and also in favor of an international miners' strike at the earliest possible moment.

COAL STRIKE.

In Which Several Prominent Tucsonites Are Interested. From the Tucson Citizen. El Traffic, of Guaymas, Sonora, publishes an account of the works prosecuted by Col. Francisco H. Garcia, at the coal fields of San Marcial, in the State of Sonora, by which it appears they have struck a solid vein of coal six feet thick. They had passed through two smaller veins before reaching this, and are now going down on slate and shale and probably several other veins will be reached within the next three or four hundred feet. The coal at the place struck has lost the brittle peculiarities which characterized the veins in the outcroppings, and now presents a compact bed equal to the best anthracite of Pennsylvania. The place where the drill is boring is three miles from Marcial, in the valley. B. V. Garcia and S. Ainsa, of this city, are partially interested in these properties, and the Citizen extends congratulations and hopes that they may soon realize the results of many years of persistent labor on these extraordinary coal beds. This Territory and the whole Pacific coast will derive benefits incalculable from the discovery.

PRISON COMMISSIONERS.

The Territory to Receive Revenue From Convict Labor. From the Tucson Citizen. The Territorial Prison Commissioners have authorized the superintendent, Captain Ingalls, to enter into contracts with San Francisco parties to supply them with hemp made by the convicts from the native wild flax which grows in great abundance along the lower Colorado. The San Francisco parties have already advanced \$500 for 100 cords of hemp to be cut by the Indians. This will be delivered to the prison and there worked into the commercial article and shipped to San Francisco. The Commissioners also authorized the superintendent to construct a separate apartment fifty squares to be cut from the solid wall and used for female prisoners so that they can be kept entirely separate from the rest of the prisoners.

Pima County.

From the Tucson Citizen. There are 1601 voters registered in the Pima county Great Register. It is said that the number of sheep sold in New Mexico and Arizona during the last thirty days reaches 150,000, and that the average price paid is \$2 a head. This makes a total of \$300,000 let loose among the sheep farmers. It is understood that Edwin Fairfax will name the Deputy Sheriff if Al Bernard is elected. Mr. Fairfax, with all his accomplishments and "foine Italian hand" cannot boast Mr. Bernard into a seat which is reserved for J. K. Brown. Tramps are beginning to make their appearance. They are of a gang which work throughout the county during the year, immigrating regularly as birds. They are due here in October and November, in New Orleans during the winter, thence northward and eastward, back again, arriving here as due in the fall months.

Arizona's Indebtedness.

The Census Bureau has sent out a pamphlet giving the financial condition of counties. The gross debt of Arizona is by counties, \$1,540,697, or an increase for ten years of \$1,196,480. The interest paid by the counties of our Territory is \$102,519 annually. The net debt of the counties is \$1,212,586, while the total available resources are \$337,112; the bonded debt of the counties from \$105,200 in 1880 to \$1,050,500 in 1890, while the floating debt has increased from \$118,017 in 1880 to \$490,197 in 1890. There are forty-five States and Territories in the Union, Arizona ranks twenty-eighth in amount of bonded indebtedness, twelfth as regards floating indebtedness and twenty-fifth in total amount of indebtedness, and the same as regards the total of available resources.
