

CITY HALL EXHIBIT

Fine Display in the Art Department.

Full List of the Prize Winners.

Yuma Horticulturists Make the Best Showing of Citrus Fruit.

The west side of the upper story of the City Hall is devoted to horticulture and art. In the south room the ladies have especially demonstrated the fact that their art is to conceive and make beautiful things.

First upon the right of the door tucked well up on the wall is a quilt with the patches worked into an immense star. It is twenty-five years old and was made by the present Mrs. N. J. Coffey when she was but 13 years of age.

Some paintings of great merit, representing the old-fashioned school master, probably intended for the character "Squeers," of "Dickens," "Nicholas Nickleby," and two belligerent pupils, were executed by Miss Blandy, of Prescott.

Another piece of work which deserves special mention is a quilt made into blocks of white silk and upon each block is painted a cluster of different kinds of flowers. This work was executed by Mrs. Flinn, an aged lady of Holbrook, Arizona.

A vase containing twenty-one varieties of roses in the garden of Mrs. Masten and two pans of flowers from Mrs. Logan's, also a beautiful bouquet from Mrs. Rothrock's garden.

Mr. Max Kalisher has on exhibition some glass scrolling or painting, work which is very uncommon and requires great skill.

In the north room of Horticultural Department are fruits fresh and dried, and preserved in every manner. The premiums in this department have been awarded as follows: For the best raisins and figs, Mrs. Kline, first prize, Mrs. Norton first premium on dried peaches and Mrs. Emery Kays for dried apricots.

Mr. E. M. Mills drew first prize on hand-painted jar of fruit and tomato catsup. Mrs. E. P. Belton took the second prize on pickles and jams.

There are pears, peaches and strawberries from the orchard of Mr. Henshaw of fine varieties. Mr. Henshaw has had strawberries from his garden continuously since the 20th day of April until the present time.

Probably the most notable exhibit in the hall is from Yuma. There are green branches of orange, lemon and lime trees, with the fruit hanging of a quality that cannot be outdone in California or Florida.

The Yuma exhibit is from the orchards of Mr. C. H. Brinley and Mr. Gondalfo between whom the prize for citrus fruits was divided.

Mr. J. B. Montgomery takes first prize for Lacompe pears. They are splendid specimens and the whole exhibit there is probably not one but will weigh a pound.

Mrs. Webber drew first prize for butter and Mrs. E. Kays second. A fine display of pomegranates is made by Johnson Bros., of Mesa City, also Mr. Hudson, who brought in a branch which alone carried twenty-five pomegranates. The Johnsons took first prize and Mr. Hudson second.

This evening there will be singing by some of the best talent of the city at the Hall. Tomorrow evening the Orion orchestra will be in attendance.
