

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
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NOTICE. TERRITORIAL BONDS FOR SALE. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT THE Loan Commission created by an act of Congress, approved June 25, 1890, known as Title XXXI of the Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1887, has directed the Territorial Treasurer to advertise, in accordance with said act, for the sale of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) worth of bonds of the denomination of one thousand dollars (\$1000) each, said bonds bearing interest not exceeding five per cent (5 per cent) per annum.

Interest payable annually at such place as may be designated by the Board of Loan Commissioners, or at the option of purchaser, on January 15 of each year, bonds to run fifty (50) years. No bonds to be redeemed under twenty (20) years after their issue.

Bids for the purchase of said bonds will be received by the Territorial Treasurer at the City of Phoenix, County of Maricopa, Territory of Arizona, until 12 o'clock WEDNESDAY, December 10, 1890, at which time and place they will be opened in the presence of bidders.

No bids can be entertained for less than par or face value of the bonds and accrued interest, if any.

The bonds are authorized to be issued for the redemption of bonded or other indebtedness. The act of Congress was approved June 25, 1890, and provides for the levy of tax to pay interest and for the redemption of the bonds at maturity.

The Board of Loan Commissioners reserve the right to reject any and all bids. Bids should be addressed to the Territorial Treasurer, Phoenix, Arizona, and endorsed "Bids for the purchase of Territorial Bonds."

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
