MARK SMITH has openly said that he could not do anything for Arizona because Congress was Republican and he was a Democrat. Vote for George W. Cheyney and thereby secure a man for Congress who can do some good under a Republican administration for this Territory.

The Tombstone Epitaph has the following regarding the disreputable business methods of C. Meyer Zulick:

Zulick is a nice, clean old man to ask for the votes of workmen. When he had about come to the end of his rope in his swindling schemes at Naasori, Mexico, he paid off the men working for him in checks drawn on Tombstone. When he knew there was no money to meet them. Is this the kind of a man to ask the suffrages of honest people, especially workmen? He and Mark Smith are running on the same ticket.

COMPELLED by the demands of his business interests, Henry Koshland has withdrawn from the Republican ticket in Mohave county as a candidate for the Territorial Assembly. In his stead, the County Central Committee has nominated M. C. Copeland, the agent of the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad at Kingman. Mr. Copeland's nomination is a happy one. He is a young man, full of vigor and enthusiasm, and would make for his home county such a representative as she needs.

SAYS the Mohave County Miner: "A joint discussion on the issues of the day is going on between Hon. R. C. Powers and C. Meyer Zulick, candidates for the Council in Maricopa county. Zulick now has an excellent opportunity of explaining many things that the people of Arizona would like to know." Yes, Zulick did have a chance to explain but he refused to do it, dodging every question put to him by Governor Powers. However, THE REPUBLICAN will do some explaining for Mr. Zulick; enough at least to show up his true character.

VOTERS should beware of betting on the ensuing election. Several tools of the Democratic ring are around, diligently to get bets for small amounts from those opposed to their ticket. They have succeeded, in several instances, with those who are unaware that the law specifies that betting upon the result of an election is valid ground for a challenge at the polls. These ringsters can well afford to lose their votes, if by so doing they destroy the votes of a dozen opponents. The trick is being played for all it is worth, and is fully on a par with the other disreputable efforts of the gang.

THE CHIEF OF LIARS.

Cornered and defeated in logical argument in his debate with Governor Powers last Saturday night, C. Meyer Zulick not only evaded direct questions put to him, but stood before that great audience and "lied like a horse thief."

Has this man Zulick grown so depraved through his evil associations that he thinks the people of this county are such fools and knaves that he can stand up before them and deliberately falsify, knowing that he is falsifying, and then expect the suffrages of the people? To show the infamy of this man THE REPUBLICAN will specify some of the most notorious of his lies.

He lied when he said the reason the Asylum Directors were not prosecuted was "because Clark Churchill was Attorney General," for he well knew that the same day his message was published to the Fourteenth Legislature he appointed Briggs Goodrich Attorney General, a man who had just been defeated for the Council in Maricopa county and who was under indictment at the time, a fact he had good reason to remember, for through his good offices said Attorney General's salary was doubled;

he well knew that John A. Rush, another Democrat, succeeded Briggs Goodrich in office. Now he talks about abolishing the office in the interests of economy.

He lied when he stated that Clark Churchill created the Board of Pardons so that he could draw large mileage fees from the Territory. Clark Churchill was a resident of Prescott, the capital, when the Board of Pardons was created, and afterwards, during the sessions of the Board, and therefore could not draw mileage.

He lied when he said that the salaries and expenses of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission are paid by tax upon the cattle, when he well knew that, although that was true when the law was first created, that the Fifteenth Legislature relieved the cattle industry of this tax and made the expenses of the Commission payable out of the General fund and Zulick signed the bill.

He lied when he said that John Dorrington received \$900.00 for printing for one quarter from the present Board of Prison Commissioners. The truth is Dorrington received a trifle over \$200 for printing more than a quarter's business.

He lied when he said that Hon. Chas. R. Drake was appointed Receiver of the Tucson Land Office as a reward for illegally continuing the session of the Fifteenth Legislature.

He lied when he wantonly insulted Hon. Richard E. Sloan by calling him a bribeless lawyer. "Dickie Sloan, who never had but three cases in his life and two of those before a Justice of the Peace, and that he was appointed Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona as a reward for his work in the Fifteenth Legislature."

He lied in his speech on the plaza when he said he had nothing to do with the office of Territorial Geologist, but that Wolfley's Legislature was responsible for it. The truth is that the office of Territorial Geologist was created by the Fourteenth Legislature and provision was made for payment of the incumbent of the office by the Fifteenth Legislature, Act No. 51, which act was signed by C. Meyer Zulick.

He lied when he said he recommended to the Fifteenth Legislature the passage of an act providing for a Constitutional Convention. He did recommend a memorial to Congress in the following words: "I therefore recommend that at an early date you memorialize Congress to pass an Enabling Act, whereby the people may elect delegates to a Constitutional Convention, preparatory to admission as a State." His position was exactly the same as Governor Wolfley's, that an Enabling Act is a pre-requisite to admission.

He lied when he said he resigned his office as Governor of Arizona, as the following telegrams will show:

PHOENIX, A. T., October 19, 1890. To Hon. JOHN W. MOORE, Secretary of the Interior, Washington, D. C. C. Meyer Zulick asserts on stamp he resigned March 4, 1889. Did he resign or was he removed? Answer. ARIZONA REPUBLICAN. Received at Phoenix, A. T., 3 p. m., October 20, 1890.

Dated at Washington, D. C., October 20. To Arizona REPUBLICAN, Phoenix: Zulick was removed by Executive order, day of March 12, 1889. GEORGE CHANDLER, Acting Secretary.

We ask the intelligent voters of this county if, after such a showing, they can vote for this man Zulick. Think you that a man who will deliberately and with malice aforethought, lie in this manner is fit to be trusted? Think you he would be honest as an Legislator? Does it not rather indicate that he has sunk so low in the moral scale that he would, if elected, be constantly on sale for the highest bidder?

Weigh these questions well and consider whether or not you can afford to be represented in the Territorial Council by a man who is destitute of self pride, destitute of truth, and destitute of honor?

SAYS the Tombstone Epitaph: "Geo. W. Cheyney is entitled to the votes of our citizens for several reasons: First, because he is an honorable man; because he is fully competent to fill the position he seeks; because he is not a trick politician; because he has been an employer of men and always treated them fairly; because he is not under the thumb of the Zulick gang and the Mormon church; because he has assisted in developing the country by bringing in capital; because he is a mining man; because he will try and do something for the Territory; because he will not, with an excess of jaw, talk the President into a fit of disgust when he is considering measures that are of vital interest to Arizona; because he is rearing a family of girls in Arizona; because he will be at his post of duty on time; and lastly, because he is a good, sound Republican."

At the joint debate, held on the Military Plaza, Phoenix, last Saturday,

between ex-Governors Powers and Zulick, the latter, not to be outdone by anyone, boasted that he, as well as Mr. Powers, had a military record, and diffused information to the effect that, after fighting nobly for his country, offering his blood and services for the preservation of the Union, he returned covered with wounds and glory, to hang his gory sword on the wall and to resume the pursuits of civil life. He let it appear, also, that he returned with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, in a regiment of Pennsylvania's noblest sons. Feeling assured that the snatty politician from New Jersey lacked bravery enough to be a soldier, even as he lacks a number of other excellent attributes, THE REPUBLICAN telegraphed to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, to see if, in the records on file in the office of the Secretary of State, there was a mention of such a personage as C. Meyer Zulick on the roll of officers of the citizen soldiery, who rushed to the defense of the Union and their State. Yesterday the following telegram was received:

HARRISBURG, Pa., October 20, 1890. To ARIZONA REPUBLICAN, PHOENIX, A. T. Pennsylvania records show no officer by the name of C. Meyer Zulick. C. W. S.

Can it be that this demagogue is masquerading as an old soldier, as he also masquerades as an honest man? To be ranked as one of the Nation's defenders has been his dearest wish, if his efforts to gain admission to the Grand Army post at Prescott be fair to judge from. He could not secure admission to the post, an honor that is the due of any old soldier, for he had no war record to show. Putting these things together, does it not seem as though he, the ass, is seeking to cover his tell-tale ears with the lion's skin? Nothing better could have been expected from this person; but the continued evidence of his depravity will surely cause a rebuke at the polls that will send him back ignominiously to his home on the Atlantic shore.



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

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, UNDER AN ACT OF THE Territorial Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona, entitled "Elections," approved March 8, 1887, it is provided, "there shall be held throughout the Territory upon the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1888, and every two years thereafter, an election of members of the Legislative Assembly and such other officers as may be required by law to be chosen at such election;" and

WHEREAS, It is further provided in such Act that "not less than thirty days before the general election, the Governor must issue an election proclamation, designating the time of the election and the officers to be elected;"

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Nathan O. Murphy, Acting Governor of the Territory of Arizona, in pursuance of the duty enjoined upon me, do hereby order a general election to be held on the TUESDAY after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1890, and designate the officers to be filled at such election as follows, to-wit:

One Delegate to the Fifty-second Congress of the United States.

Twelve members of the Council of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory.

Twenty-four members of the House of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory, apportioned agreeably to existing laws, as follows:

County of Pinal—One member of the Council and two members of the House of Representatives.

County of Cochise—One member of the Council and five members of the House of Representatives.

County of Gila—One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

County of Maricopa—One member of the Council and two members of the House of Representatives.

County of Mohave—One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

County of Pima—One member of the Council and five members of the House of Representatives.

County of Pinal—One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

County of Yavapai—One member of the Council and five members of the House of Representatives.

County of Yuma—One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

The county of Yavapai shall elect one member of the Council jointly with the counties of Gila, Graham, Pinal and Maricopa; and the county of Cochise shall elect one member of the Council jointly with the counties of Graham, Gila, Pinal and Maricopa; and the county of Mohave shall elect one member of the Council jointly with the counties of Pinal, Maricopa, Pima and Yavapai; and in each of the counties where the offices have not been consolidated with the office of Sheriff by act of the Board of Supervisors, one Assessor shall be elected.

Also in the several precincts of each county one Justice of the Peace and one Constable, except in precinct No. 1 of Pima county, two Justices of the Peace shall be elected.

And I do hereby offer a reward of \$50 for the arrest and conviction of any and every person violating any of the provisions of Title IV, Part I of the Pinal Code.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the Territory to be affixed.

Done at Phoenix, the Capital, this 22d day of September, A. D. 1890.

TERRITORY OF ARIZONA.

COUNTY OF MARICOPA. OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

WHEREAS, By an act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona approved March 19, 1888, entitled "An Act to amend paragraph 47, being section 1, chapter 25, title 25, Revised Statutes of Arizona 1887," it is provided that the officers of precincts are one Justice of the Peace, one Constable, one Recorder and such other superior and subordinate officers as are provided for elsewhere in this Act or by the Board of Supervisors, and in each precinct containing more than eight hundred inhabitants, there shall be two Justices of the Peace and two Constables; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Maricopa county has duly ascertained that each of the precincts of Phoenix, Tempe and Mesa, of Maricopa county, contains more than eight hundred inhabitants, whereas it is hereby ordered that there shall be elected at the next general election in the several precincts of Maricopa county the number of precinct officers hereinafter mentioned, to-wit: In Phoenix precinct, two Justices of the Peace and two Constables; in Tempe precinct, two Justices of the Peace and two Constables; in Mesa precinct, two Justices of the Peace and two Constables, and in each of all the other precincts one Justice of the Peace and one Constable.

In witness whereof, we hereunto set our hands this 22nd day of September, pursuant to an order of the Board of Supervisors of Maricopa county.
