The county has been "too much governed" during the past two years and the people want a change.

JOKES ABOUT HIS LIES.

"Boys, I wonder if God will ever forgive us for all the lies we told those people last night."

This is the remark made by C. Meyer Zulick, at Gila Bend, Thursday morning to Frank Cox, T. E. Farish, L. H. Chalmers and others of his Democratic confederates, in reference to speeches the night before. Mr. Zulick was performing his morning ablutions at the time the remark was made, and it was overheard by a lady in the house where he was stopping.

He has not as yet made any effort to deny or parry the charges of wholesale lying made against him by THE REPUBLICAN, October 22. In his speech at Gila Bend, holding up a copy of THE REPUBLICAN, he referred to the charges as being ridiculous, and many supposed he was going to read them and try to explain them away. But O, no! Not Zulick. He merely said of the telegram in reference to his soldier record, "Why, they might as well have telegraphed to the Governor of Texas."

We believe that in this case C. Meyer Zulick did by accident speak the truth. The Governor of Texas probably knows as much about C. Meyer Zulick's soldier record as anyone else, for the reason that he has no such record for anyone to know anything about.

He will no doubt attempt to deny his statement at Gila Bend, but it is a fact that he made it and can be verified. He knew that he had been making false statements to the people, and then joked about it to his fellow looters. Remember, C. Meyer Zulick, that there is an old saying "Be sure, your sins will find you out." Some of your sins have found you out and THE REPUBLICAN will continue to present more of them to the people.

It is a question for honest voters to decide, regardless of politics, whether or not such a man as you and other ringsters associated with you shall again get into position to rob and plunder Arizona Territory and Maricopa county. You have shown by your record and by the records of your appointees to office that even if you were not directly a participant in the stealings you at least winked at them, or else you were so ignorant that to again place you into office would be compounding a felony. THE REPUBLICAN has too much faith in the good sense of the people of Maricopa county, in their honesty and probity of character, to believe they will intrust to such a man as you the responsible position of Councilman.

When the citizens of Maricopa county desire any information from W. C. Bashford, of Prescott, as to the standing of a resident of Maricopa, they will ask him, and it is not any credit to send his records to this county. It strikes us as though this Bashford gang of corrupts had about all they could attend to at home without offending decency and overstepping the bounds of propriety, and unloading their filth on the people of Maricopa county. Governor Zulick will answer to our people and not to this Bashford gang of corrupts for his conduct, and no person aside from a blackguard would have ever went out of his way to tell falsehoods about a man who is not in any manner menacing upon their domain. Governor Zulick is a better man, a more honest man than any Bashford that ever left a track in Arizona, and so the people of this Territory will testify.

The above eloquent, elegant and peculiarly logical article is an editorial clipped from yesterday's Phoenix Gazette. It is a reply (?) to a little paragraph in the Republican papers to the effect that Governor Zulick paid taxes in Yavapai county only once, and then upon the sole item of a gold watch. Thinking that many of THE REPUBLICAN's readers may have never had a chance to admire the beauty and elegant argument of a Gazette editorial, we present the above as a fair sample. Incidentally, it might be mentioned that Mr. Bashford's letter was asked for by citizens of Maricopa county; and it was solicited by several of the heaviest taxpayers in Phoenix.

The announcement in yesterday's telegrams relative to the incorporation of a railroad at San Diego, reaching toward Phoenix is one which may mean nothing and may mean much. Oft times incorporations are made and rights of way obtained without any real intention of actually consummating the enterprise. Yet, on the other hand, the route would be an eminently feasible one for the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe to build upon and that great company may be looking this way. It is to be hoped that the latter view of the situation is correct. With a through line of transcontinental road furnishing lumber and outside supplies direct, affording a way whereby the products of the valley might be cheaply and expeditiously conveyed to the Eastern markets. Phoenix would enter upon a career of prosperity and progress that would soon place her among the largest cities of the Pacific Coast. In connection with the talk of this railroad attention is called to an extract from the San Diego Union in another column of this paper.

The people of Maricopa county look to the District Attorney to guard their interests equally with the members of the Board of Supervisors, of which body he is the legally constituted adviser. Does anyone think that Frank Cox will ever institute suit against Neri Osborn for the \$1034 unlawfully taken by that person from the county? Does anyone think that Frank Cox, should he be re-elected, would do any better than he has in the past? He has allowed bare-faced hoodling to take place under his very nose, fully cognizant of it, and yet in only one instance did he take any notice of it.

To show how "nifty" were the efforts made by Mark Smith to pass the North and South railroad bill, it might be instanced that before a committee of the House of Representatives the immortal Mark made this assertion: "Gentlemen, you can do what you please with this bill now. I will never call it up or attempt to pass it."

There is an excellent reason why no valid reply to the arguments advanced by the Republican journals is presented by Democrat press or speakers. They have no arguments to make. Cold facts cannot be cast down from the pedestal of truth.

At the Democratic meeting last night C. Meyer Zulick devoted the major portion of his time to personal abuse of the editor of THE REPUBLICAN. He talked a great deal, but said very little that could possibly be construed into being an argument either in his own behalf or against an opponent. He did not attempt to deny the many and specific charges of malfeasance in office that have been brought home to him, preferring to exhaust his time, his wind and the patience of his hearers in a venomous combination and reiteration of all the adjectives in the English tongue that would serve to show the personal hatred he feels for one man, who has incurred his displeasure by exposing his delinquencies. The only weapons this demagogue Zulick has in his armory are abuse and lies, and by his frantic and aimless use of both he is the more and more exhibiting to the people the shallow and vain weakness of a character that is strong only in evil intentions.

Only another campaign falsehood circulated by the Gazette, is to the effect that Joe Alexander is to be Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in the event of Brent Kirkland's election. The proposition is absurd on the face of it, and hardly merits denial. Of course no such compact has been entered into. Mr. Alexander is a business man of large interests in this county, by politics a consistent Democrat, and has served the county as long as he has only through a desire to be of benefit to its citizens. Mr. Alexander's means are sufficient to cause him to regard the salary of Clerk as a very small item, and it is understood that he has said he would not again accept the office under any consideration.

The reason why Marcus A. Smith deserted his post of duty to stay in Tucson as a champion of the men who assaulted the flag of the Union is well understood and will be sufficient to secure his defeat at the polls.

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ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, UNDER AN ACT OF THE Territorial Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona, entitled "Elections," approved March 8, 1887, it is provided "there shall be held throughout the Territory upon the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1890, and every two years thereafter, an election of members of the Legislative Assembly and such other officers as may be required by law to be chosen at such election;" and

WHEREAS, It is further provided in such Act that "at least thirty days before the general election, the Governor must issue an election proclamation, designating the time of the election and the office to be filled;"

Now, THEREFORE, I, Nathan O. Murphy, Acting Governor of the Territory of Arizona, in pursuance of the duty enjoined upon me, do hereby order a general election to be held on the TUESDAY after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1890, and designate the offices to be filled at such election as follows, to-wit:

One Delegate to the Fifty-second Congress of the United States.

Twelve members of the Council of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory.

Twenty-four members of the House of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory, apportioned as follows, to-wit:

County of Apache-One member of the Council and two members of the House of Representatives.

County of Cochise-One member of the Council and five members of the House of Representatives.

County of Gila-One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

County of Graham-One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

County of Maricopa-One member of the Council and two members of the House of Representatives.

County of Mohave-One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

County of Pima-One member of the Council and five members of the House of Representatives.

County of Pinal-One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

County of Yavapai-One member of the Council and five members of the House of Representatives.

County of Yuma-One member of the Council and one member of the House of Representatives.

The county of Yavapai shall elect one member of the Council jointly with the counties of Yuma, Mohave, Apache and Maricopa; and the county of Cochise shall elect one member of the Council jointly with the counties of Graham, Pinal and Pima.

Also there shall be elected in each county of the Territory one Probate Judge, one District Justice of the Peace, one Recorder, one Surveyor, one Recorder, two members of the Board of Supervisors, and in each of the counties where the offices have not been consolidated with the office of Sheriff by act of the Board of Supervisors, one Assessor shall be elected.

Also in the several precincts of each county one Justice of the Peace and one Constable, except in precinct No. 1 of Pima county, two Justices of the Peace shall be elected.

And I do hereby offer a reward of \$50 for the arrest and conviction of any and every person violating any of the provisions of Title IV, Part 1 of the Penal Code.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the Territory to be affixed.

Done at Phoenix, the Capital, this 22d day of September, A. D. 1890.

TERRITORY OF ARIZONA, COUNTY OF MARICOPA.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

WHEREAS, By an act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona, approved March 15, 1889, entitled "An Act to amend paragraph 47, being section 4, chapter 13, title 15, Revised Statutes of Arizona 1887," it is provided that the officers of precincts are one Justice of the Peace, one Constable, one Coroner and such other superior and subordinate officers as are provided for elsewhere in this Act or by the Board of Supervisors, and in each precinct containing more than eight hundred inhabitants to be ascertained by the Board of Supervisors, there shall be two Justices of the Peace and two Constables; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Maricopa county has duly ascertained that each of the precincts of Phoenix, Tempe and Maricopa county, contains more than eight hundred inhabitants, wherefore it is hereby ordered that there shall be elected at the next general election in the several precincts of Maricopa county the number of precinct officers hereinafter mentioned, to-wit: In Phoenix precinct, two Justices of the Peace and two Constables; in Tempe precinct, two Justices of the Peace and two Constables; in Mesa precinct, two Justices of the Peace and two Constables, and in each of all the other precincts one Justice of the Peace and one Constable.

In witness whereof, we hereunto set our hands this 26th day of September, pursuant to an order of the Board of Supervisors of Maricopa county.
