Indians Congregating for an Outbreak.

General Miles Speaks of the Situation A Queer Story From a Montana Reservation.

Chicago, November 20.—General Miles this evening received a telegram from Rushville, informing him that General Brooke's command reached Pine Ridge at 7 o'clock this morning.

Indians are coming in in large numbers from Rosebud. There is much excitement, and the ghost dance continues.

General Miles also received a communication from an officer at the camp on Poplar river, Mont., dated November 17, containing matters of interest with reference to the Messiah craze.

As an instance of the stories floating around, the officer tells one current on the reservation to the effect that several young warriors started from there to visit Sitting Bull and learn about the new Messiah.

General Miles expressed great satisfaction this evening that General Brooke's troops had reached the agency this morning before the Indians had inaugurated hostilities, and that the further west the hostilities are not committing any violence.

He reports that he found the Indians much excited and keeping up their famous ghost dances with a zest and perseverance that is alarming.

Some of the messiah told Norville that several of the hostiles had urged them to go and join in the ghost dances, making threats that if they did not that enough of a force would be sent against them to kill them all.

PARNELL'S OFFENSE

Lightly Considered by His Irish Supporters.

DUBLIN, November 20.—United Ireland says: "We do not desire to condone Parnell's grievous sin, but from Ireland, which he has served so long and faithfully, with such dear devotion and magnificent success, he may at least look for generous forbearance in the hour of his trial.

At a private meeting of Irish members of Parliament today it was unanimously resolved to remain loyal to Parnell.

At a great Nationalist meeting today, the Lord Mayor made the opening address. He said the only crime of which Ireland would take notice was one that Parnell was incapable of committing.
