LEAD SMELTERS.

Satisfactory Close of a Conference, Looking Toward Combination. CHICAGO, December 5.—The conference of representatives of numerous smelting works throughout the country, closed last evening. President Thompson, of the National Lead Trust, said the meeting had been very thorough, harmonious and satisfactory to all. It was agreed, he said, to have an association, and the conference decided to recommend the adoption of this plan, by all smelting and refining companies in the United States. The conference will meet again in Chicago, should the plan gain the approval of those interested.

NATURAL GAS.

A Fine Flow Tapped Yesterday in Stockton, California. STOCKTON, December 5.—A large flow of gas was struck today in the well being bored by the county to furnish fuel for the new court house. Several gas flows have been struck in the well, but the largest was reached today at the depth of 1800 feet. It is estimated that today's flow will measure 30,000 feet every twenty-four hours, which, with other veins tapped, would make the daily flow more than 80,000 feet.
