

LOCAL BREVITIES.

A real fog was a surprise to the citizens of Phoenix on arising yesterday. The Tax Collector yesterday issued 250 tax deeds for property sold for taxes a year ago. E. Arnez is doing a lot of work on his mines on Buckhorn Gulch, above the Castle Creek Hot Springs. George Coble and party have been camping at Castle Creek Hot Springs about three weeks. George is very much improved in health. The balance of the machinery for the Trinidad Mining Company's mill, on Whipsaw Gulch, was yesterday loaded on freight teams for the mine. There was a well attended meeting of the Farmers' Alliance yesterday. Resolutions commending of the North and South railroad bill were passed. The late rains have made the roads to Castle Creek so soft that freighters experience considerable difficulty in getting their loaded wagons over them. One of the especially attractive features of the Episcopal musicale Thursday night, and omitted in yesterday morning's report, was a vocal solo by M. M. Harris. Foreman C.
