COLONEL POSTON, agent of the Agricultural Department, is doing good work in this valley in stirring up its farmers to the cultivation of special crops of more local benefit than the production of cereals.

TOMBSTONE does not fear the operation of the Sunday law. The Prospector says: "We wish it distinctly understood that our business men years ago voted to close their doors on Sunday, and ever since the stillness of a New England Sabbath has brooded over us on the day of rest."

A TRIAL was made recently of an electric motor of the Crocker-Wheeler type fitted to a gatling gun as a substitute for a man in conducting the firing operations. The test was entirely satisfactory. A speed of 1000 shots per minute was easily reached and maintained.

TELEPHONE communication with vessels at anchor has been tried with much success at Havre, France. As soon as the steamer or a large ship drops her anchor in the outer harbor, a telephone line is thrown on board and the captain thus brought in direct communication with Havre, and even with Paris.

"PEACE on earth, good will to men," is the motto for Christmas. Yet THE REPUBLICAN'S telegraphic columns yesterday contained a record of over a score of murders, suicides and other violent deaths on Christmas. Surely mottos avail little and the sacred character of the day had no influence for good, for the record of violence was larger than it has been upon any one day for months.

SAN FRANCISCO'S morals have been freely commented upon by visiting writers, and those of any experience in the ways of the sinful world don't hesitate to affirm that the city by the Golden Gate is the wickedest on earth. Cosmopolitan in the most extensive way, vice is there cloaked in a variegated garment, that from one point of view is alluring, and in another repulsive in the extreme. Crime seems to be common to all grades of society, from a hoodling board of supervisors down to the vagrant upon the street. And yet, even in such a city, one would not expect to see advertisements of low houses so freely published as they are in the Examiner.

At the present time South America is looming up with more promise than it has for several decades. It is gratifying to note that much of this development is to be attributed to Yankee enterprise. The latest proposition is to thread that hitherto almost unknown country, the United States of Colombia, with a number of long railways, a concession having been given for such roads to a citizen of Milwaukee. Such a road would make a great feeder for the main trunk line that will soon and surely be established through Central America to join the two continents with iron bands. Every other nation on the Western Continent is dependent upon the great North American Republic, and all efforts should be made to tighten the bonds of commercial union.

The latest scheme of the Navy Department and one which is meeting with the approbation of all true Americans is to found a naval militia from which in time of war an additional marine force could be mustered into the service, fully trained and equipped for active service. During the war of 1812 the vast superiority of the American navy over that of England lay in the manning of its craft. Its victories were won by the fact that patriotic Americans manned the guns, men of brain and of brawn who had flocked to their country's assistance in an hour of need. In the event of another war there is little doubt that nearly all the fighting will be done upon the high seas. No foreign country would ever be invaded by American troops and no nation on the face of the earth would dare to invade the United States, when the electric spark could in an instant summon a million men to arms. The next war will be a succession of contests upon the high seas between fleets of iron and the victory will be with the side that is the more efficiently directed. The need then becomes apparent that into the navy or its auxiliary service should be mustered the best manhood of America, that the country's flag shall never go down in defeat.

DWELLINGS and buildings of all kinds are now rendered secure with greater facility than ever by means of the electric lock. By the use of this lock, which can at any time replace the lock ordinarily used, the entrance doors of private residences, apartment houses, offices, banks, etc., can be absolutely controlled by a person in another part of the building. The pressure of a button, located at any desired point, closes the circuit and the current passing through a magnet inside the lock releases a lever. The spring then throws back the bolt and the opposite knob can be turned and the door opened. In the apartment houses the button (one for each suite) is placed near the speaking tube, which runs to the outside door.

THERE are even now some men in this community who sigh for the days of old, when all freight was transported from Yuma, drinks were sold at twenty-five cents and barley was worth \$4 a hundred. Because they, personally, were more prosperous in those days they inveigh against the present order of things and, especially, the railroads, which they especially consider the source of all woes. Such a view is indeed a narrow one. Phoenix is indebted to a railroad for four-fifths of her population and prosperity, and will increase in like ratio for every line that comes to her. The more railroads the better, for railroads bring new life, thrift, energy, capital and population.

In response to the oft-uttered plaint of "farming don't pay," the following from the Riverside, Cal., Press is printed: "Fresh tomatoes are being shipped East by express lately, where they are sold as high as 50 cents per pound. Here tomatoes are wholesaled at 1 cent a pound. Green peas have brought \$4 for a twenty-pound crate, and strawberries \$20 for thirty-pound crates. If 40,000 pounds of tomatoes can be raised from one acre—which has often been done—how much profit can be made at those figures? The profits on orange pale into insignificance in comparison. And all kinds of vegetables may be grown here the winter through equally well."

"The United States," declares the Age of Steel, "is now the Vulcan of the planet. There is no such output of iron and steel scheduled on the slate of any contemporary nation. The iron worker is busy, the forges are red, the glow of the furnace is unremitting, the molten metal is a continuous stream, and the product of the anvil and caldron is networking our streets, our alleys, mountain road and prairie plains with lines of Bessemer steel; iron girders span the rivers and bridge the gulches; ships with metal ribs ride the sea, and in the architecture of our cities, from the trap of a sewer to the dome of a temple, steel and iron are practically ubiquitous and mechanically supreme."

PROPOSALS. FOR PUBLIC PRINTING. PHOENIX, Ariz., December 8, 1891.

THE UNDERSIGNED WILL RECEIVE separate bids for the laws and journals of the Sixteenth Legislative Assembly of Arizona, for printing, binding, presswork and material, as follows, until January 10, 1892: Composition in book form, in long primer or small pica solid, between the lines and paragraphs, the work to be measured in all cases as plain work, side notes to be measured separately in the laws, according to the type in which they are set, but the head notes to be considered as only a part of the page and not to be measured separately; half titles and blank pages in the body of the work not to be allowed, except when absolutely necessary. Binding of the laws, 500 in pamphlet form and 200 in calf; of the journals of each house, 225 in pamphlet form and 50 in calf. Presswork for each token of 500 impressions, eight pages to constitute a form. Paper for above work. Bidders must accompany their proposals with a bond of \$1000 for each of the two books, conditioned for the faithful performance of the work. The right to reject any or all bids is reserved. The laws to be delivered within twenty-five days, the journals within sixty days after the adjournment of the Legislature. Final payment to be made after work has been approved by First Comptroller of the United States Treasury. Further information given by N. O. MURPHY, Secretary of Territory.
